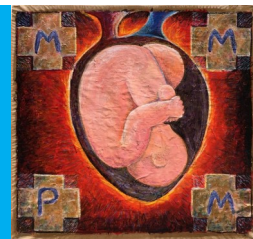

Presence

Manu – ‘Presence’

The presence of birds on the sea indicated that food was abundant. In the Gospels Jesus refers to the birds of the air having no home. They are just there, available with no expectations except to point to things other than themselves. Their feathers were highly valued. So too are we, present among young people, like Mary, making her Son, Jesus known and loved.



Simplicity

Te Ika – ‘Simplicity’

The fish represents abundance and faith. It is also uncomplicated, straightforward and genuine and reflects changes in our life. Our role too is to present a world of learning to children and young people as directly and uncomplicated as we can.



Family Spirit

Turtle – ‘Family Spirit’

The turtle represents patience and endurance. There is warmth about the turtle that reflects in us a willingness to accept others as they are. We work to make children and young people happy and comfortable by inviting them into community and develop a sense of belonging.



Love of Work

Mako – ‘Love of Work’
