FIRST AID WORKSHOP by Adelino Soares



On Thursday 16th January 2020 I suggested

to the Brothers in the community to have a one-day workshop about "first aid", so we had this workshop on 8th February.

It was a great time for us to know about it. According to me, it was a need for our community. I have discovered that this basic learning about the basic techniques of first aid was really helpful for the community, because not all of us know much about first aid. I was very happy because the brothers allowed us to have this workshop. I saw that all of us were really interested and we were involved right from the beginning of the workshop, and each one of us also raised questions to know more about the fundamentals of first aid, and this can be responding to our community life, to be compas-



sionate and take care of one another in the community. And some other things I have learned from the workshop is that Henry Dunant was the co-founder of the Red Cross. "The legend of this solitary man lives on to this day and his passionate sense of universal brotherhood". _"First aid is assistance given by a trained first aider to a patient or casualty at an emergency, in accordance with standard theories and techniques using the available materials in the surroundings until professional medical help is sought."



Apostolic experience with the Charity Brothers

My apostolic work started in September 2019 in the Charity Brothers school for disabled children. Every week on Thursday I, with my two second year novice friends, **Nghi** and **Liu Cong**, went to work with the children in that place.



I really liked to work and play with

the children, but on the first day when I started my apostolic work there, I found it quite difficult to deal with them. After a while, I tried to be close to them and talk, but it was not easy. Later on I discovered three things that made it difficult to deal with them. Firstly, I cannot speak Sinhala. Secondly, they cannot speak English, and thirdly, some of them are not able to play or even to speak.

So, when I came home, I asked myself "what I am going to do with those children?" In my mind I said that I will do nothing with my apostolic work ... it was too hard to deal with them, but I continued to try my best to approach them we went. I talked with them with my body language and made some funny sounds to make them laugh and encouraged them to approach me. Right now, I find it very easy to work with them, and in my experience some of them now really try to have some conversation with me.

They also have two places that we go to work. One place we go is to help those who work in the maintenance or manual work area. And the other place we work in in the classroom with the students to see what they are learning. Those children are very kind and generous for us to work with them. **By Isac**

OUR WAY: LIVING IN COMMUNITY

In February 2020, as a response to a Workshop on the Marist "Rule Of Life", we Novices wrote the following reflection based on our personal experience and reading of Ch.2 "Our way: living in community".

Introduction: Brother, your experience of fraternity is the most precious gift you can offer to a world in turmoil. Do your best to develop with your brothers a constant mutual love. Keep in your heart the last and most important wish of Marcellin before he died: "That we may say of the Little Brothers of Mary



as the first Christians, see how they love one another." Doing this, you will feel Jesus more and more present with his love and peace, as the early disciples at Emmaus. He will give you courage and energy for all the challenges of your mission as you strive to make this world more fraternal.

Live Simplicity: We are called to live a simple life, as in Nazareth. Supporting one another, we treasure each one in and appreciate what each shares. Like Mary we keep these things in our heart. Our vocation is to help people to recognise Jesus in the way and manner we help, listen, share, and encourage one another to step forward in prayer and ministry.

Be a Community Man: Above all we must depend on God and ask for grace to live as a community. Brother, as the Emmaus story tells us, in order to live as a community, coming from different backgrounds, we must open ourselves to listen and to share our story with others if we are to build up our community life. We share things in the love of Christ, knowing that God's love is boundless and shared equally among us. We are called to radiate this love by taking care of one another. His love is revealed in each one of us and from there spreads out to the world. Be aware of your gifts and strengths, as well as your difficulties and challenges, in order to be able to offer help and receive help from one another. This reciprocal way of sharing will help you to grow in your daily experiences, spirituality and skills. You will always find great strength for your journey in living together as family. Living this way will give you joy and happiness, and in this joy you will know you are home. Being a brother amongst brothers is a blessing for us, leading us ever deeper into the experience of God's love. Brother, for the difficulties you will encounter on your mission, realise that your religious community is a good base where you can find shelter and provisions, where you will be nurtured and given rest. And as a community member you are called to exercise a sense of responsibility and a willingness to be accountable to each other.

Forgive One Another: With your brothers, decide to always be faithful to the new commandment of Jesus to "love one another", always available to support one another in all the daily situations of your life, being present to your brother when it is required. Try to see each other every morning with new eyes.

Take Care of Your Heart: To be a brother today you are called to accept the limitations of each other and willingly forgive each other's mistakes. The brother's life has many challenges in our world today, so the encouragement and understanding we can extend to each other is very important, helping us to go forward in our vocation. Keep strong your spiritual life. It is a most precious thing. If you find that your work is continually taking you away from prayer and community activities, then when troubles come, so too will the temptation to walk a different path. If the body doesn't have a heart, how can that body survive? So, brother, take care of your heart, your personal and spiritual life, that your sense of lifefulfilment, balance and relationship with God is nurtured in every moment.

Be a Man of Prayer: As a consecrated brother, called to be both mystic and prophet, you are to express your contemplative nature and deep prayer life both communally and personally. Spend time with Jesus, share your life with him and listen to him. Really feel his presence always and everywhere, and every day he will bless you abundantly. With your brothers you will experience the truth of these words: "Wherever you go, I will go." Furthermore, know deeply that your vocation is a great gift calling you to rest, together with Jesus, in God, who lives at the centre of your heart. This 'rest' can be practised through meditation, staying close to the Word in Lectio Divina, and by reflecting in your Examen on God's voice speaking to you through your daily experiences.

Brothers on Mission Together: As brothers of the Institute, we come from different countries and sent on mission to places of desperate need around the world. As pilgrims like those young disciples on the way to Emmaus, we experience Jesus risen when we share our lives and stories. As they went in haste to meet the eleven and the others, we are reminded that whatever we do, we do so always together with Jesus, our brothers and Lay Marists ... who, with us, have experienced the embrace of Jesus' that then sends us on mission. Missioned by the Institute, know therefore that in all those you encounter in your life and ministry ... we see the face of God.
