MARIST CARE HOME PROJECT

Lagao, General Santos City, Philippines



A team of Marist Brothers was created and has met twice during the months of September and October to discuss the proposed Marist Care Home Project. The team is composed of Bro. Allan de Castro as Chairperson, Bro. Dominador Santiago as de facto member, and Brothers Teodulo Fernandez, Wilfredo Lubrico, Romulo Porras and Cristino Sta. Ana. The team has also created a facebook (albeit, private) group page, where they can discuss matters relative to the project.

The Sacred Heart Formation Center (formerly Marist Aspirancy House) was selected as the location for the project. The decision to select this

place was the result of the: (a) Survey made by the

Province Center, (b) Deliberation of the Marist Care Home Team and (c) Approval of the Provincial and his Council.

By and large, the project began smoothly in the preliminary stages, with Bro. Cristino inviting prospective Architects and Engineers to do site investigation of the proposed location. The following professionals are:

- 1. Engr. Enrico Mariano the assigned engineer to supervise the Marist Spirituality and Missionary Center, Lake Sebu.
- 2. Arch. Marissa Ober former NDMU faculty and now, a designer-builder-contractor.
- 3. Arch. Albert Joseph Non son of retired Engr. Alberto Non, builder-contractor of some Marist buildings in the cities of General Santos and Koronadal. Arch. Non has since established his own construction firm.
- 4. Arch. Bren Buenavista & Engr. Alfred Abao designer and main contractor, respectively, of the SPC Sisters who owns the General Santos Doctors Hospital.
- 5. Arch. Michael Ang builder of the Marist Aspirancy House and the Provincial Center. (Arch. Ang is yet to be contacted, as of this writing)

FIRST MARIST BROTHERS IN CHINA

It was around July of 1890 when Fr. Battembourg, C.M., Procurator General of the Congregation of the Missions in Paris and Br. Theophane, Superior General of the Marist Brothers, began negotiations on the sending of the Marist Brothers in China. In November of 1890, the six Brothers where chosen. These where:

- 1. Br. Marie-Candide, 35 years old, Director;
- 2. Br. Aristonique, 29 years old, Sub-Director;
- 3. Br. Antonin, 20 years old;
- 4. Br. Loui-Michel, 20 years old;
- 5. Br. Joseph-Felicite, 19 years old.

Coming from Europe and finding themselves in a land that was all new and strange to them, the Brothers had undoubtedly braced themselves for surprises. Yet, the biggest surprise of all was probably the discovery that Msgr. Jean-Baptiste-Hippolyte Sarthou, C.M., the Vicar Apostolic at that time, was expecting them to take over two schools, and not just one. Aside from the French College at Peking, they were supposed to take over St. Louis College at Teintsin (now Tianjin) as well. It was a school for foreign children, in which the language of instruction was entirely in English. The Children in this school were sons of consuls and even of Protestant ministers. Regardless of how this confusion came about, the result was that two French Brothers who had been in Australia, were sent to China in the summer of 1891. These were Br. Cleophas and Br. Marie-Julien.

This was how the story of the Marist Brothers in China began.
