
activities, reconfiguring existing structure, and many others.

REMEMBERING BROTHER RENATO B. CRUZ, FMS1

The following article is a homily delivered by Br. James F. Adams, fms during the Funeral Mass for Bro. Renato Br. Cruz, fms on May 19, 1997 at the Immaculate Concepcion Cathedral, Cotabato City²

Part Two of Two Parts

Chapter Eight: Ministry in Illness



It was the last week of October. The year was 1994. Brother Renato Cruz had just recently celebrated his 53rd birthday. He came to me at the end of our provincial council meeting and said, "Jim, take a look at my skin." As he showed me his leg and his side he said, "What do you think about these black and blue marks? Look, I have several... like bruises but I didn't fall, nothing hit me. What do you think are they?"

The next day he left to attend a meeting in Manila, and while there, consulted a physician at the UST Hospital. After some tests he was informed that he had chronic myelogenous leukemia (CML), a kind of cancer of the bone marrow. He was told there was no known cure.

At first, in his shock, he told no one. But his scientific mind was working overtime. As he went through the normal feelings of denial, "This can't be true; not for me... I am too young for this," he began contacting friends in the medical profession both here and around the world. At first through the mail, and later by computer through the internet, he was furnished with a summary of the current medical literature... up-to-date and complete and with always the same conclusion. Although CML is perhaps the best known and most understood cancer, there is still no cure. Moreover, for people over fifty years old, certain treatments to possibly prolong life are more risky and less likely to succeed. In fact, statistically speaking, the typical person can expect to live only 3.4 years from the first diagnosis. Ray lasted only 2.5 years, an indication perhaps that he had this disease before October 1994.

When he came home from Manila in early November he commented: "I have learned of my sickness at such an appropriate time... the season of Advent... a time of waiting. How fitting. I can now accept this sickness and wait for God's plan." Little did he know that his waiting would last two and half years.

But this waiting was not passive. He was most active. He cooperated fully with his physician. He was invited to the United States for a more definitive diagnosis after Christmas and there, enjoying the friendship and hospitality of the Provincial and the other Marists, he learned that, medically speaking, there was little hope. More waiting.

On February 14, 1995 he wrote from New Jersey, USA: "Waiting has become a new part of my spirituality, and the Lord has been continually drawing me to re-examine my priorities and to be in closer intimacy with Him." Now I am beginning to understand what De Mello used to say about enjoying the present moment instead of worrying about yesterday and tomorrow. I am also being challenged to live out what I have been preaching about contemplation and the present moment. The experience of anxiety has revealed so much of my fears and the ever enduring love of the Lord in spite of my slowness of heart to respond to Him. I am also feeling homesick, and I would like to go home as soon as I can. The Lord is certainly calling me to live uncertainty and to have a deeper faith in Him. My health is in his hands, and I can only trust in his healing power and plan for me."

And so the final saga of the life of Renato Cruz began in November 1994. He saw that his sickness opened new vistas and, as he got weaker and weaker, he grew closer and closer to God. He allowed the leukemia, in a way, to further evangelize him. He became more grateful. On his birthday in 1995 he wrote: "I am also grateful for the opportunities of deepening my relationship with Mary during this difficult period in my life. Mary is becoming more real to me, and the Rosary has taken on a different role in my life. I am not too old, after all, to rediscover new ways of communicating with Mary and reflecting on her life." In February 1996 he wrote to the Brothers: "Maybe my sickness is a call to take God more seriously, and I am urged from within to continue encouraging all of you to be faithful to our call as Marists."

By August 1996 he welcomed his sickness as he said, "I now realize that my sickness is God's gift to me and to those I relate with. So many other surprises are in store for me, and I need God's light and strength to welcome them."

In his last letter to the Marists on Feb. 14, 1997, he wrote: "My hospitalization and suffering during the months of December and January take on new meaning after the experience of Bishop Ben's funeral Mass. My sufferings pale in comparison with the Bishop's painful death. Brothers, I have many more things to share with you, but they can wait for another time."

On Friday, May 9th, at UST Hospital, it was 8:10 PM. The last of the visiting Brothers had gone home. Ray had waved a hand in greeting, but it was also in farewell. I began the Rosary... the five sorrowful mysteries. Ray sat up in bed motionless. As we ended with the sign of the cross, he raised his right hand with all the IV tubes attached and blessed himself. A few minutes later he closed his eyes to rest... in peace. God had called home his faithful son.


As one of his friends abroad wrote in a letter of condolence the other day: "Certainly this season when we celebrate Jesus rising from death to new life, returning to the Father and sending the Holy Spirit, was an appropriate time for Ray to return home also. He will be even more effective as protector and intercessor from heaven than he was here on earth." And, we here in Cotabato might add, he continues to be a *ray* of light in the lives of so many of us. I can hear him saying, "Brothers, I have many more things to share with you, but they can wait for another time."
