EARLY EXPERIENCES OF THE FIRST GROUP OF MISSIONARIES TO CHINA¹

The following are excerpts from the letters of Br. Marie-Candide² to the Superior General about their experiences during their first two years in China as missionaries:

In one of Br. Marie-Candide's earliest letters from Peking, he writes, "... all that I had heard about Peking, and all I had read is far below the truth. It's quite frightful, and hard to believe one walks in stinking mud up to the knees.... typhoid fever takes a lot of victims; this is the sickness that carries off the majority of missionaries and few are able to avoid it."

In another letter he wrote: I have just read an account by a missionary, who is in the Southern part of the Kiang-si province, where looting is taking place. It is heartbreaking. The leaders at the head of the movement, in order to cause an uprising among the people, cut the throats of children, take out their eyes and heart, and then accuse the missionaries of these horrors....


Poor China, what a secret destiny (there must be awaiting her)! It is incredible what has been done for its salvation over the centuries; what is still more incredible is the sterility of all the efforts made to deliver the country from the power of [Satan]. It (always seems) to have to be started again... What is disconcerting is to see one's zeal, one's ardor, one's elan fail [almost completely]; one's generous illusions fall nearly at the first step. The virtue that one needs above all, the completely indispensable one, is patience.

In my opinion, the Father³ is right to ask for Brothers who are happy persons. In this country, much of what is around us makes one [melancholic], for there is a lot of sadness and plenty of ugliness. Anybody who is naturally inclined to grieve would have much to suffer...

In Tientsin, the Europeans banded together and got organized for a common defense; however, with their small number of 200 in a city of 200,000, there was much left to be desired in terms of safety and security. In Peking, the Brothers were told to take refuge in the British Legation in the event of an emergency, in spite of the fact that the British Legation's ability for a strong resistance was doubtful. In the midst of these uncertainties, Br. Marie-Candide writes:

The best thing, I believe, is to put oneself entirely in the hands of God, and this is the approach we have taken for a long time; as a result, we are without fear, without any apprehension. What misfortune could happen to us who are here for the God Lord, to whom we have given everything, sacrificed everything, our persons and our being? Apart from sin, everything else can only be gain for us. This is the thought that is our joy, our happiness, and which makes us thank God for the call we received. What a glory for your children, Reverend Brother Superior, if they were called upon to suffer for our Lord... Whatever happens, whatever be the portion reserved for us by Divine Providence, we try to be more and more pious... more and more united to Jesus Christ in order to obtain all the graces we need.

But one year after they left France to come to China, Br. Marie-Candide's letter offers its readers some consolation and relief, also in this regard: And may we not consider also as a grace, the rumors and menaces of persecution that have been ringing almost constantly in our ears since our arrival? There can be no doubt that these contributed to nourishing our piety, our fervor, our spirits of faith and our confidence in God. And on the other hand, we know that they have caused our Brothers in France to offer prayers and petitions for our success; these pleas and prayers have been answered, for not only have we not been troubled, but

the work we started has never ceased to make progress, and to strengthen.

²Br. Marie-Candide, only 35 years old, was the Director of the first batch of 6 Brothers from France who arrived in China in November 1890. They were assigned to take over a French College in Peking and St. Louis College at Tentsin (now Tianjin), in which in the latter, the language of instruction was entirely in English.
