Those of us who have friends and relatives in the flood-hit regions - Buller, Nelson and Marlborough, will be all too familiar with the destruction that 'Mother Nature' is capable of causing. As recent as this week, the news continues to remind us that we continue to battle with 'severe weather' across the country. So what does all of this mean for our Catholic community at Sacred Heart?

As Headmaster, Steve Dooley, described at a recent staff meeting, our community can be a safe haven from all of the bleakness that we see in the world around us. In a world where we are ridden by not only extreme weather but also pandemics, riots and economic unrest, our Catholic and Marist charisms are more important than ever. We are incredibly lucky to be part of a community that cherishes such values so dearly and holds true to them not just in spite of all the pain and suffering in the world, but perhaps even because of that pain.

'The problem of evil' is a common challenge to religion. It argues that God cannot exist where there is evil and suffering in the world. And in today's world, we certainly cannot deny the apparent existence of such suffering.

St Augustine responded to this challenge by stating that evil is simply the 'privation of good.' As such, where there is good, evil cannot and will not prevail. And so we are called to continue to do God's work, in spreading the Word of God, and spreading good, so as to dispel the appearance of evil and the suffering that it causes in the world.

We Pray that Champagnat's Mission continues through us ...

"What a privileged vocation we have as Marist educators, Brothers and Laypeople, women and men, young and old, called to be Champagnats for this younger generation. Brothers meet with Keith Simento, Appointee Principal at St Paul's College





Various Brothers from the Marist communities in Auckland gathered for a morning tea at the District House to welcome Keith Simento, the appointee Principal of St Paul's College. Keith will take up his role there in the second week of Term 4.

Keith was accompanied by Denis Wood, the chair of the St Paul's College Board of Trustees.

Keith briefly shared his story with the Brothers. His home area is near the great city of Bangalore in India, which is steeped in Christian history. Keith attended St Joseph's College (Jesuits). He trained in Environmental Chemistry, and he subsequently migrated to New Zealand in the late 1990s. He has been teaching at Auckland Grammar School for the past 2 decades. Keith is a parishioner of St Mary's Parish in Avondale.

Keith spoke passionately about his new leadership role at St Paul's College. He also spoke eloquently of his impressions of the college, which is a family-oriented school with a wonderful heritage, marked by an outstanding spirit and explicit Catholic values.

Denis Wood shared some insightful reflections on the Board's strategic plan for the college over the coming years. Denis described the unanimous confidence among members of the Board, in how Keith will implement the vision.

The Brothers responded by sharing their own stories in connection with the College. Many of them were past students of St Paul's. The Brothers sang a Marial Hymn of blessing and offered a plaque of Saint Marcellin Champagnat, as their small symbolic reminder of the Catholic and Marist character of the College.
