International Communities for a New Beginning is an initiative of the Marist Institute open to Brothers and Marist Laypeople who feel called to dedicate a period of their lives to go beyond their geographical and cultural borders. It is characterized by sharing life in mixed Marist communities, global availability, internationality and inter-cultural living and mission, responding boldly to emerging needs.

After a series of conversation with the candidates and their respective families by the Coordinator of Province Volunteering and endorsed by the Provincial of East Asia Province, Miss Kimberly A. Camiring from Notre Dame of Marbel University – IBED and Miss Arianne Jane V. Ylarde from Notre Dame of Dadiangas University commit themselves to join the Lavalla200> communities' preparation program.

The purpose of the Program is to help them discern their motivation for international and intercultural life and mission; gain a deeper appreciation of cultural diversity and understand the personal challenges to be faced in living cross-culturally; and develop new competencies, practical skills and a spirituality for intercultural living.

Arianne and Khim will report to Rome on or before June 7, 2022 to comply with the 10-day quarantine requirement of Italy. Their discernment process will start on June 18, 2022 up to July 23, 2022. Their schedule is as follows:

June 17 – 22, 2022: General House, Rome June 22, 2022 – July 16, 2022: Manziana, Rome July 17 - 23, 2022: L'Hermitage, France

After their Preparation Program, Khim and Arianne may be sent either to one of the Lavalla200> communities (Atlantis, South Africa; Holguín, Cuba; Moinesti, Romania; Mount Druitt, Australia; Siracusa, Italy; Tabatinga, Brazil) or to one of the special projects of the Institute, such as MDA (Marist District of Asia), the Fratelli Project in Lebanon, Solidarity with South Sudan and others.

The Marist Education Council (MEC) headed by Bro. Allan DE Castro, FMS continued to implement programs and activities for the wholistic development of students at all levels. The challenges brought about by the pandemic of Covid 19 have not stopped the schools in creating new ways of delivering the services it used to offer during the pre-pandemic period. The schools actively participated in the activities of the MEC committees chaired by:




NDKC held Organic Agriculture Seminar workshop at Lao Integrated farm.

NDC visited the adopted school and community at Kiga, Upi, Maguindanao.




Pediatric Vaccination (5-11 Y/O) in Marist School Marikina

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The following article is reprinted from the research paper done by Br. Niño Pizarro and Br. Demosthenes Calabria. This Research Paper entitled <u>60 Years of Marist Presence in the Philippines (1948-2008)</u> was part of the requirements of the Patrimony Course in Rome in 2008. This section is found in pages 119-121.

The Philippine Marist Brothers' Contribution to the Institute

As of this writing, the Marist Brothers are celebrating 60 years of presence in the Philippines. The former Philippine Province, now a Sector of East Asia Province, is a clear manifestation of the good seed sown by the Missionary Brothers and the first filipino brothers. Today in the Philippine islands there exist eleven communities of the Marist Brothers including Marist Asia Pacific Center and excluding the Mission Ad Gentes Brothers in Davao. We have six schools to administer in which two are in a University status and one is in a College status, one foundation for the street children and two mission areas. In the Sector, the total number of Brothers is fifty-three including the seven Scholastics at Marist Asia Pacific Center.

Since the name of our Congregation bears also the type of work that we mostly engage, I should say that one of the contributions made by the Filipino Marist Brothers to the Institute is their commitment *"to make Jesus Christ known and loved"* and to form young ones to become *"good Christians and virtuous citizens"*. We are expressing this commitment through our presence in the school as classroom teachers and administrators, through the way we live in a community, and our desire to be missionaries and to reach out to others outside school setting. We are educators and the Brothers do not forget it. It runs through our veins. To be in the classroom is a privilege and it has never been a tiring work for us. In our respective communities in the Philippines, we live in simplicity and show our care for our Brothers. Our hospitality is evident. Our warm acceptance of others manifests our Filipino culture as person-oriented community. Many of our Brothers in the Philippines are willing to work in mission areas like in Palawan and China. At the moment, we have a Brother who has been in China for years. We also sent two Brothers to Mission ad Gentes program.

The organization of Champagnat Movement of the Marist Family in the Philippines has been a good initiative in the Sector to affirm and acknowledge the efforts of our lay Marists who are also living Marcellin's Spirituality.

We are also proud to say that in the past we have Bro. Renato Cruz who was first appointed by the Superior General to become one of the General Councilors, and he was sent by the Superior General as delegate to the Philippine Province to act as a Provincial while maintaining his role as a General Councilor. After a couple years, he became a full-time Provincial of the Philippine Province.

I think it is also worth mentioning the young ones who were guided by the Brothers in our Formation houses but did not persevere. They left the Congregation, but they still carry with them the values that they learned from the Brothers. ###.
