St Marcellin Champagnat, the founder of the Marist Brothers, lived through the French Revolution, at a time when hope was scarce. This never deterred him however, from doing what he believed God was calling him to do. In fact, the challenges he faced, the neglect he saw and the despair he felt, were the impetus for his vision for the future, a vision which brings us all to this College today, where that same vision is treasured, embraced and lived by the Brothers, the staff, the boys and their families.

As he understood the needs of those around him and responded to the signs of the times, so all at the College are called to do so in carrying on its mission

here, Catholic Education.

One of the current challenges for our world, country and communities, is clearly Covid and how we deal with it.
