Have spiritual direction because it's the first time in my life journey as a religious brother. My spiritual director is a religious sister from Sri Lanka. She is very friendly with me and I have found it very easy to talk with her about my spiritual life. When our formators first introduced her to us, Sister shared about her life and mission as a religious. It attracted my heart to deepen my own spiritual life and vocation.

I meet with her once every month for about one hour and it's very helpful for me because I am learning about myself and I am learning who Jesus is for me, how I encounter Jesus in others and how I sense Jesus is present in my heart. One thing I find really helpful is I am able to talk to her about what I can't share with other people. Sister listens very well and asks me questions to help me respond. This helps me grow more in my prayer life. Every time I finish my accompaniment with Sister, I feel free because I release all the things that are stuck in my heart.

Perhaps this is meeting at least **three of my needs**: a sense of satisfaction that our formation program is helping to build up your self-confidence and skills; it gives me hope that your developing communication skills will help you negotiate the challenges that lie ahead in your future ministries and community life, and this nourishes in me the love and energy to keep going as a formators for a few more years.

My request, if you are willing, is that you keep on practicing these new NVC skills that you are learning, that we do so in future Personal and Group Accompaniment meetings, and that you practice with each other, in 'the heat of the moment' when you find that anger is arising in you. Is that OK with you?"

As well as ourselves, we had 35 others participating in the program, from 2 men and 5 women Congregations. This was our first larger workshop post-Covid, and so was very much appreciated by everyone, after such a long time attending classes etc. just with their own members.
