The First Marist Brother who died in Sri Lanka
Brother Jules Lawrence (France)
From March 1911 to August 1913, Batticaloa Mission

Bro. Jules Lewrence was of a delicate temperament his piety had nothing ostentatious, but it was very sincere.

In Kalmunai, where he died, Bro. Antony said that he shared with him the same room. The last book he read was, "Les quinze etapes ou pas spirituels dans la



voie des exercises de saint Ignace." Copies of this book had been presented by its author, P.Emile Becker SJ to Rev. Fr. H. d'Arras who presented a copy to the brother.

He was of an optimistic disposition and was very courageous. On one occasion during a walk brother came across a small poisonous snake, he succeeded in catching it, and put into a match box and in his pocket, brought it home.

In the large hall of St. Michael's College, classes had no partition between them. Bro. Jules' class was adjoining to Br. Antony's class; Bro. Jules had what then called the special class first year that is children who came directly from Tamil schools where they had passed at least the third standard but knew no English... His pupils were a lively set. There was a good deal of noise but plenty of work. He wrote a number of some seven or eight digits on the blackboard, wiped it out and asked the boys to repeat the numbers, it was surprising how his pupils could remember big numbers which they had seen for just second or two and repeat it.

During one of our excursions after re-crossing the lagoon which was at that point very broad, he insisted on getting along into a small rowing boat with an out –rigger and to venture out by himself on the water, the lagoon was rather rough and the brother inexperienced rowed in a direction parallel to the waves. The fishermen on the shore and brothers too were getting alarmed, the fishermen shouted to him in what direction he should raw, he followed their instructions and manage to raw back safely.

In drawing he was good, with the help of Rev.Fr. Rector he mastered perspective and geometrical drawing. His enthusiasm for these subjects was such that it became communicative and Bro. Antony also got a taste for them, so much so that in Negombo Brother Antony said: he could coach up the Cambridge junior students in the last of these two subjects for their examinations.

Before brother Jules got sick in Kalmunai, Brothers had begun a novena to St. Luke the patron of Painters for him in the approaching drawing examination, but the brother was called to his reward before the exam begun.

Bro. Antony said that the last service he had to render the good brother was to close his sightless eyes after his soul had taken it flight for a better world. Bro. Jules died on 8th August 1913. Rev. Fr. H. Burry SJ the parish priest of Kalmunai told Brothers , that on several occasions he had prayed to Bro. Jules to obtain favours from heaven and the good brother helped him.

I admire all the Brothers who guided us to love Jesus and Mary. Thank you, Brothers.

Interview had for year of Vocations

Here I am sending the script of my sharing.

Say your name, where you from? Where you work? Your function- mainly your Marist Connection.



Ayubowan, Greetings from Sri Lanka. I am brother Chamara and I belong to the Marist Province of South Asia.

After a decade of school ministry as a teacher, currently I work as a counseling officer at the State ministry of Justice, Prison management and Prisoners Rehabilitation affairs in Sri Lanka.

There I work with the youth who are addicted for dangerous drugs and with a result of taking drugs, they have done various harmful things to them, and to their families and to the society as well. I reflect this call for me based on the Bible in the book of Isaah the Lord has

anointed me to proclaim freedom for the captives and release from darkness for the prisoners....

Tell your Marist experience highlighting a special moment that makes you feel deeply the Marist vocation.

I am proud to say that I am from St.Mary's College, Negombo, a school managed by the Marist Brothers at that time. The presence of the Marist Brothers was very much touching and striking for me. There were four things touched me most.

- 1. I found that the brothers were very simple, friendly with students and teachers, easy to be with them and it was easy to approach them at any time.
- 2. I saw brothers were teaching in classroom, they were in playground, They were praying with students, in choir and were doing church activities
- 3. Third whatever we did in the school The presence of Mother Mary was present. I am a devotee of our good mother from my childhood and Brohers and Mary were not two things but I felt they bound as one. I loved that.
- 4. The remarkable thing I notice was when the first student arrives to the school brothers were there welcoming and they remained in the school until the last child went back home. This showed how responsible and how much they care of the students with compassion and love. The presence of the Brothers gave vitality to all in the school.

These four things struck and inspired very much in me and there I discerned to be one like them. I decided I wanted to Be a Marist Brother.

Why is it important to be Marist to-day? Based on your experience.

Marist way of life is still life giving and relevant. Why? I believe our time has no difference of the time of Champagnat. My experience of working with two youth groups in Sri Lanka and the work in Prison rehabilitation centers where the drug addicts are always found that they are

Neglected and abandon by the society no one is there to listen to them The society has labeled them and treats like they are not a part of the society

They are lacking in opportunities and there were no a platform for them to perform And they were lacking in proper guidance and unable to identify themselves as who they are

Our way of engaging with them we accept them as they are not considering their gender, color, race, religion or social states what the people have set up categorizing the people in society. It is our duty to generate a new life in them and guide them to a green pastures. As a counselor I listen to them with empathy without judging and that is the first moment they begin to open and change their life remembering their past with tears. For one year we work with them with various therapies, counseling and guidance, and through vocational training we try to create a new life in them. We see their smiling faces when they finish and leave home after one year of Rehabilitation and after most of them are leading a good and a happy life.

What is the relevance of being Marist Today? Based on my experience

Actually Champagnat's dream was to have Brothers in all the dioceses in the world so we still need brothers and laity who can work together. Together we can reach to the underprivileged with compassion. Based on my work I see young people are the vulnerable group in our society and we need to remind them that They are the most powerful beings at present.

How about you? What is your Montagnat Today?

What I experience we do not have to go far or beyond where we are. Montagnat's are everywhere. They are...

Waiting for you and me, they need love and acceptance, there are montagnats who loves to be listened

Who feels lonely and poor, who lacks with proper guidance and who are unable to identify themselves, who are not aware of their capacity. My montagnats are the youth who are in Prison and I influence them to create their future and making their dark past as a privilege to make the future more clourful and fruitful. Let me share one of my experience I faced recently when I was going to work I saw a young boy was walking along the road and that walk was not normal. He was walking closing his eyes and his head was up while he was moving. I felt it was not normal and when I got close to him he started wormitting. I managed to take him to a bus stop where he could sit. When talked to him he started shiuting and at the same time he was crying. In fact unbelieble

he was 18 years old and he is married nd his wife left after two months of marrage. He was a good student from a very good school and he couldn't continue his studies because of this marrage. He had no job and his parents also lost all hopes had in him. There was no way for living and parents also gave him up. So his wife too left him alone his friends avoided him. The only solution he found to relax was taking drugs. He began with cigarate, alchohol, marjuana, cocain , heroin and when I men him he had used ice the most dangerous drug at present. So after talking I led him for the rehabolitation and I could contacted his parents. So this is a true example I believe our Montagnat's are everwhere. When I open my eyes, hands and minds we see vulnarable youth in our own sorrounding. Mary our good mother walks with me as a sister in my faith journey and I am inspired by Champagnat our model and founder and I strongly believe Providence that's make me moving and giving life and courage.

My life journey in MDA

Seasonal greetings to you my brothers and sisters of Marists. When I was asked to send an article for the Newsletter, I was so happy to do... first time someone asked me... it's a great gift and thanks Br. Chamara.



I am Br. Alex, at present, a member of the MDA (Mission Ad Gentes). South Asia Province sent me happily to the Ad Gentes Program in 2007. After the preparation from 2008 to 2016 I was able to find a new mission with the Santal tribal children in West Bengal (Talit community and Hostel) along with other brothers. It was a good experience to begin a new mission for the poor and needy children. Later, I was asked by the General administration to move to the Bangladesh School Community. While I was waiting for the Missionary visa to Bangladesh, a short period of doing a mission with the migrants' students and Thailand for 4

months, and the formation ministry in

Davao Postulancy for 4 months. Once the Visa was ready I moved to Bangladesh 2017 April to the school community for two years. Then I was asked to take the leadership of Candidates and Aspirancy house Mymensingh, the present one. I am very thankful to God for his blessings and guidance though I went through so many obstacles to reach something good in the mission. I learned more in this missionary life than what I expected.



At present in the Community we are three brothers, *Br. Cesar from Mexico, Br. Robert from Local diocese of Mymensingh* – *Bangladesh who is doing his degree in B.A. English in Dhaka city and staying with Holy Cross Fathers and I.* Also, we have 2 Aspirants at this moment and both of them from the same diocese. Maybe in a few weeks we are expecting some more candidates and incoming Aspirants... (hopefully) who are waiting for their academic



results. Actually, we have been living in a small rented house for the last 10 years. This year we have a plan to buy a new piece of land for our own and build a good formation house and community building soon if God allows us. Sometimes we have a good number of boys in the house... this picture shows a big group which I experienced last three years in this house. Among them two of them are postulants in Davao, four become aspirants, but due to their personal problems, they

left the formation, one candidate who is doing his second-year college. (class 12). Many young boys came and left for a few reasons. Many of them came for the purpose of their studies. Some find the place is not enough, being in the rented house, and not much space

for them to play or work, so they feel something very indifferent to compare with the other formation houses. So, the finding of the new place may help the boys to feel something helpful to continue their formation with future hope.

This small community had a simple celebration of Christmas and our Foundation day with a meaningful prayer service and fraternal meal. Our Aspirants back to the formation program. We began our work with them after a week break. We have a plan to collaborate with the other local religious congregation and our Aspirants also will join with other formees for their classes. next month they will have their community experience with the school community which is far from here and travel at least 6 hours by bus.



Last week of November 2022, Br. Virgilio (Community leader of Giasnogor school community) and I celebrated our 25 years Religious Profession anniversary in a simple way here in Mymensingh. It was a very meanigful and simple celebration along with the local religious people and our Bishop who is a simple and humble person.







I am happy to share something about ourselves. May God bless all of us and lead us as he planned this New year 2023.

Lavalla200 International communities are comprised Brothers, lay men and women, single and married. I have been part of this project since 2018, having lived three years in Tabatinga in Brazil, and one and half years in the Lavalla200 International community in Cape Town, South Africa.

Last year in March, I marked 25 years as a Marist Brother. I had lived in various Marist Communities for twenty years which were comprised of Brothers only. These years lived with Brothers have been what I had experienced as a young boy living in a hostel run by the Marist Brothers. I had aspired to live in a community of Brothers—living, working, praying and eating together. This is something that gives me life in a community.



Joining the mixed communities of Brothers and lay was something I had not aspired to, had not dreamed of, and is not part of my culture, especially to live with women (other than your biological family) under the same roof and, worse, to share a toilet with her.

I found the Lavalla200 communities full of challenges, variants in cultures, languages, manners, behaviours and mentality. The locations where the communities were situated had their own challenges and peculiarities. The community in Tabatinga had many things contrary to how I had been brought up culturally and socially. There was a constant invitation to be out of my comfort zone.

In brief, Tabatinga and Atlantis were constant invitations of shedding and pruning of self, of adapting to new realities, customs, people, food and mission. I wasn't used to the mode of travel by boat in the Amazon River, or how stay safe among the gangsters of Atlantis.

The people of Tabainga and Atlantis were tremendously loving, caring and beautiful souls, that have changed my life. The members I lived with in the two communities—Br. Isidoro, Veronica Rube, Juliana Kittel, Mario, Martha Martinez and Br. Luke, and most recently Br. Tony Clark, Liz Igoy, Denies Hernendez and Mariana—have taught me many things, opened my eyes and given me a much wider perspective on Marist life and Mission.

My being part of Lavalla200 communities have helped me to be out of my cultural isolation by freeing myself from self-imposed boundaries and seeing my life through a much clearer glass into the future for Marist life and Mission.

I look forward to the new challenges and learnings that being part of the new Lavalla200 community in Lilongwe, Malawi, will bring. I wish to encourage and challenge Brothers and Lay Marists from South Asia to take the challenge of living new experiences, of bringing smiles to the faces of children other than in your own country or culture. I assure you that you will be blessed much more than just being a blessing to the people you will be sent to. The community, the children and the people will move your hearts towards yourself, others and our Marist Mission which is to "all the dioceses of the world".
