## MEETING OF THE GENERAL COUNCIL WITH THE PROVINCIALS AND DISTRICT SUPERIORS

The meeting held at the General House, from March 6 to 11, 2023, prioritized reflection on the 5 perspectives for the future that the superiors listed last year, during the General Conference: spirituality, Marist vocation and co-responsibility, emerging needs, global Marist family and reconfiguration. >>

### general administration

- The meeting of the superiors of the Administrative Units with the General Council ended on Saturday. Taking advantage of the fact that everyone was in Rome, on Sunday the superiors of the two regions of America met together. On Monday the superiors of the Arco Norte Region met, and on Monday and Tuesday the provincials of Europe met. The Link Councillors with the regions accompanied the meetings.
- On Monday, Brothers Ángel and Lindley, directors of the Secretariat of Brothers Today, met online with Brothers Tony Leon and José Miguel Caballero to prepare for the Gier program of ongoing formation, that will take place in June at the General House and Hermitage. On Tuesday they met, via Zoom, the group that will advise the 2024 meeting of formators: Brothers César Rojas, Juan Castro and Michel Razafiman-dimby.
- During this week, the directors of the Bureau of Solidarity, Brothers Ángel and Francis, together with Brother Valdicer, director of Cmi, are visiting the Marists in Cuba, especially the LaValla200> community in Holguin.
- On Tuesday, the directors of the Brothers Today Secretariat had a virtual meeting with Brothers César Rojas and Graham Neist to organize the follow-up to the work of the international commission of the new Formation Guide.
- On Wednesday, Brother Josep Maria, General Councilor, held an online formation session with the Mediterranean Province on Vocation, in the context of the Year of Marist Vocations.
- Beginning Wednesday, Brothers Ángel Medina and Lindley will be in Nairobi, where they will meet with the brothers in formation and primarily meet with the Africa Formation Commission to prepare for the Regional Meeting of African Formators and Vocation Animators to be held in July of this year.
- On Wednesday and Thursday, representatives of the three Marist publishing houses (FTD, Eldevives and Gram) meet in Rome. Brothers Luis Carlos, Vicar General, Ben, General Councilor, and José Sánchez, Director of the Secretariat of Education and Evangelization, are participating in the meeting.
- From Sunday, March 19 to April 7, Brothers João Carlos and Ben, General Councilors, will visit the Province of Compostela.

## DAY ONE – MONDAY, MARCH 6

The first day began with a dialogue on the Marist vocation. The participants, divided into tables, were invited to share how the Year of Marist Vocations is impacting the life of the Administrative Units. In the plenary session the reflection of the tables was shared and it was clear that there is a crisis, but illuminated by evident signs of hope. Brother Ernesto recalled the historic moment the Institute experienced in 1822 when, five years after its foundation, there were no vocations. St. Marcellin's confidence in Mary at that time is something that should animate the Institute, said the Superior General:

"In spite of everything, as leaders, we must have hope". He also stressed that it is necessary to dare and "motivate ourselves so that the charism remains alive in today's context, even if we cannot change it". Finally, Brother Ernesto recalled how the reality of the lay Marist vocation is a gift for the Institute and questioned the superiors, "How are we welcoming and embracing this gift?" That same day there was a time to deal with canonical questions linked to particular situations. Brothers Juan Miguel Anaya and Jesús Alberto Rodríguez Delgado advised the group.

In the afternoon, Br. Ernesto introduced the theme of spirituality, conceived as a cross-cutting theme that will be present throughout the week. The participants will live a personal and community process that will help to actualize spirituality as a fundamental element of the animation of Marist life. The Superior General, recalling the leader's role as community animator, underlined that "a deep relationship is motivated by a life of interiority". And he asked the leaders to question themselves, "What sustains you as a leader? What moves you?"

Br. Ernesto gave the participants a selection of texts on spirituality taken from the Constitutions and the Rule of Life and asked each one to meditate during this week and identify the elements that challenge them personally, in their own Administrative Unit and in their mission as leaders. He also asked them to come to a concrete conclusion: "What do you think you



should promote in your Province or District regarding Marist spirituality?

The discernment process will take place in three large groups during the week, in moments of prayer in the chapels of the General House. At the end, on Saturday, the participants will share their conclusions in plenary session.

## RECONFIGURATION WAS THE THEME OF THE SECOND AND THIRD DAY OF THE MEETING OF PROVINCIALS AND DISTRICT SUPERIORS



At the General Conference of 2022, one of the intuitions which the leaders of the various Administrative Units raised was the advancement of the on-going reflection and implementation of a canonical reconfiguration within the Institute, based on criteria of vitality, viability and sustainability of Marist life and mission. During the annual meeting of Provincials and District Superior which is taking place at the General House from the 6th through the 11th of March, two days have been dedicated to that theme.

On Tuesday, during the first morning session, Br. Josep Maria Soteras introduced the theme and invited the participants to think about what “reconfiguration” means and if “transformation” is the same as “change” or should we, as an Institute, go beyond just “structural change”. He asked the participants to think about “how restructuring could be approached in a prophetic way today.”

During the second morning session, Brothers Ben Consigli and João Carlos do Prado advanced the conversation by asking if reconfiguration is “a parable of decline or opportunity?” To facilitate this part of the conversation, three leaders were asked to share their recent experiences with reconfiguration based on three questions:

- Why reconfigure?

- What were the key elements within the discernment process? and
- What learnings were gained from this this process of reconfiguration?

Using this criteria, Brothers Gaston Robert (District Leader, District of Canada) explained the process and transformation lived in Canada which recently became a District; Br. Peter Carroll (Provincial, Star of the Sea) shared the discernment process and steps taken as the Province of the Star of the Sea was formed; and Br. Robert Thunus (Provincial, West Central Europe) spoke about the on-going process that the Province of West Central Europe is taking as it becomes a District under the Province of the Hermitage. It became clear that new realities brought on by the process of reconfiguration can also create excellent opportunities for the future of our Marist life and mission. The discussion continues Wednesday, when the leaders continue this conversation and engage in defining the necessary criteria of reconfiguration and steps for the future.

During the afternoon sessions, the Provincials will meet the various Secretariats and Departments to create synergy and to share information on the projects and initiatives that the General Administration is undertaking over the next few years. On Tuesday afternoon, the Secretariats of Brothers Today and Laity presented their programs.

## LISTENING TO EMERGING NEEDS

On the fourth day of the meeting of the Superiors of Administrative Units with the General Council, that began on March 6, the Superior General and his Council proposed to the participants another call presented by last year’s General Conference: emerging needs. The Conference had asked that together, Brothers and lay people on mission:



Engage in a shared discernment to respond to emerging needs, which may demand creative re-imagination of the what and the how of our mission. Evaluate our presence among the poor and prioritise the presence of Brothers in situations on the margins. Put resources into a significant presence among young adults and give attention to those who are far from the faith. In the first session, Brothers João Carlos do Prado and Óscar Martín, General Councilors, motivated reflection on listening to emerging needs. They invited the participants to three attitudes:

- TO DISCERN in a shared manner to respond to emerging needs, reinventing the mission
  - To qualify OUR PRESENCE among the poor and prioritize the presence of brothers and sisters in frontier situations.
  - To promote a significant presence among YOUNG ADULTS and give attention to those ALOYED FROM THE FAITH.
- Then they asked everyone to reflect in groups about the new needs that have arisen in your country or province in the last 3 years. They have also put the question: How are we already responding to these needs? And finally, the participants were invited to think about the actual presences in the own Administrative Unit and verify if they respond to the new needs.

The second session was dedicated to Child Protection & Safeguarding, specifically checking how the Child Safeguarding Standards are being implemented as indicated in the Manual for Administrative Units. The meeting was advised by Councilors Ben Consigli, Óscar Martín and Ken McDonald. They stressed that to meet this standard, each Province must develop a policy committed to a victim-centered approach.

There was room for discussion at the tables, which were based on the following questions:

- Concerning the theme of Child Safeguarding what is your experience of the handover takeover as Provincial / District Leader? What did you appreciate about this process?
- What would have helped you to understand the theme of child safeguarding in your province better?
- How does your province go about monitoring the implementation of the policies in the province’s ministries?
- How does your province keep records and files concerning allegations?

The afternoon, as on the other days, was reserved for the presentation of ongoing projects by the secretariats and departments of the General Administration. Brother José Sánchez, director of the Secretariat of Education and Evangelization, spoke about the most important initiatives carried out by his sector. For their part, Brothers Ángel Diego and Francis Lukong, directors of the Secretariat of Solidarity, spoke of the initiatives inherent in the help the Institute is giving to situations in need of Marist solidarity. Andrea Rossi, director of FMSI, also presented the most outstanding Foundation’s initiatives.



## LAST DAYS OF THE MEETING WITH PROVINCIALS AND DISTRICT SUPERIORS



The meeting of the General Council with Provincials and District Superiors ended on March 11. The Superior General with his council wanted to promote a moment of synergy that can be fruitful for Marist life and mission. “We discussed and deepened the intuitions for the future of the General Conference of 2022. We wish to deepen and promote Marist spirituality. We want to care for and generate life, searching for the best structures for the future of Marist life and mission. We seek to share human and financial resources. And we want to continue to respond to the emerging needs of today’s world,” says Brother Ernesto Sánchez, Superior General. For Brother Nicholas Fernando, Provincial of South Asia, “it was an encouraging meeting with the Brothers”. The same sentiment was expressed by Brother Vincent Abadom, Provincial of Nigeria, for whom “the meeting was impressive and all the protagonists did a fantastic job. The prayers were very contemplative and lively”. And Brother Raúl Schönfeld, Provincial of Cruz del Sur, added: “I particularly emphasize the possibility of

taking up again the intuitions of last year’s General Conference and of having structured the meeting around them. The careful spaces of spirituality that we experienced at the beginning of each day were very significant. In addition, it is always a gift to make contact and grow in awareness of the global family that we are.”

### Friday, March 10

The penultimate day was dedicated to the theme of the Global Family, the central message of the last General Chapter. Brother Luis Carlos Gutiérrez, Vicar General, began the work by recalling what was requested by the General Conference last year on this theme:

Continue to develop and consolidate NETWORKS in the various areas of life and mission.

Collaborate more among the Administrative Units by sharing human and financial resources and promoting the availability and collaboration of Brothers and lay people within the Province >>>



## NORANDINA

32 participants from the national teams of the 9 areas of Marist animation in Ecuador participated in the assembly of the Mission Council that took place in Loja, from March 3rd to 5th.

## AUSTRALIA

Frank Malloy, Executive Director of the Marist Association and National Director of Marist Schools Australia has been appointed as Commissioner for Catholic Education in Western Australia, along with Celia Hammond. The appointments were announced by the regional chair of the Catholic Education Commission, Eva Skira.

## SOUTH AMERICA

Representatives from the 5 Marist Provinces of the Region participated in the first regional meeting of the Laity Network, held at the Marist house in San José, Uruguay from March 8 to 11.

## IBÉRICA

Several Marist educators from the Province participated in the Marcellin 3.0 formation program, held in Alcalá de Henares and Lardero. The program aims at renewing in its participants their vocation as Marist educators.

## MÉXICO CENTRAL

At the beginning of the month, the Marist Youth Ministry, after 3 years, organized a provincial meeting of "Amigos en Marcha", which offered an experience of encounter marked by two aspects: love of neighbor and love of nature.

# LAVALLA200> COMMUNITY IN TABATINGA



The Lavalla200> Community in Tabatinga, Brazil, is made up of Br Luke Fong (Fiji Islands), Br Altenir Pimentel (Brazil), a married couple Laura Patricia de la Maza Borja (Mexico) and Marcio Sampaio de Paula (Brazil), and Maria Alejandra Castellanos (Guatemala).

The project of our International Community centres on the Marist Social Centre "Redes" where we offer complementary activities and school reinforcement for children and teenagers. We also offer language courses in English, Spanish, French, Italian and Portuguese for foreigners. Also on offer are courses in ballet, handicrafts, guitar, singing, ethics and values.

Work is done in a network, i.e. the community is supported by volunteers, other congregations and missionaries from around Tabatinga: lay people from the Work of Mary, the Missionaries of Guadalupe, de la Salle Brothers and diocesan priests. There are also local volunteers joining the project: a 13 year old girl who is a ballet teacher, remedial teachers, including a retired lady, a young Humanities teacher, and ten young student volunteers helping out at the Marist Centre.

Interest in the Centre has increased considerably since the second half of 2022 and grew even more at the beginning of 2023, following the summer camp held in January

with 80 children and 12 young volunteers. In 2023, more than 250 registrations were made for the different courses and the demand continues. The large turnout and the massive participation of parents in the meetings are proof of the reputation of the Centre.

The Centre is running with the support of the wider community. We have received some donations to carry out our activities and to facilitate the centre's operation. Besides its activities at the Marist Centre, the Lavalla200> Community collaborates in parish and diocesan activities: prison ministry (visits, catechesis, leading religious celebrations); vocations ministry (support to the community of Santa Rosa Island, in Peru, school reinforcement and guitar lessons). The community is also working in two new local communities: Xingu and María Exaltina (catechesis, singing, community vegetable gardens). We also participate as a community in other parishes.

These and other activities fill the daily life and mission of the community. Everything is done with love, joy and dedication. "Our strength and courage come from personal and community prayer which nourishes and sustains our journey. In all this we perceive the hands of God acting and guiding us in our mission", says Marcio.

# CHAMPAGNAT GLOBAL PARTICIPATES IN THE MEETING OF BASIC EDUCATION MANAGERS IN BRAZIL



From March 6 to 9, it was held in Curitiba, the First Meeting of Basic Education Managers of Brazil, an important milestone in the development process of the Integrated Network of Basic Education in Marist Brazil. Champagnat Global, the Marist Global Network of Schools, participated in this meeting and was represented by Javier Llamas, Project Manager of the Institute's Network.

The network is made up of 96 socio-educational units and is being built in two phases of implementation: the first begins with the Marist Provinces of Brasil Centro-Sul and Brasil Sul-Amazônia and in the next stage is integrated with the Marist Province of Brasil Centro-Norte, which from the beginning has participated in the founding movements and in strategic decision-making. The management of MARISTA BRASIL has considered it very important to feel part of the global process that the Institute is promoting as a Global family that walks together and, as a consequence, a very fruitful synergy is being generated between the two networks. In a disruptive historical context of radical changes, such as the one we are living in, the challenges have a global dimension and that implies being creative, innovative and above all collaborative. Within the programme of the meeting there was a panel: "Internationalisation and Basic Education: positioning, connections and horizons", in which Javier Llamas, project manager of Champagnat Global, Marília Morosine of the Pontifical Catholic University of Rio

del Sur (PUCRS) and Michelle Jordão of UMBRASIL, shared the importance of thinking about internationalisation for our children and young people and shed light on this subject which needs more and more space in Marist schools. For this reason, the Fratelli Project is fully dedicated to marginalised groups that would

otherwise have no opportunity to access these services, provided in a familiar and welcoming environment. The project offers vulnerable children socio-educational support to provide them with a basic level of education that guarantees them access to the Lebanese public education system. The preparatory preparation for school that Fratelli provides allows the children to enter the Lebanese public system, supporting and accompanying them in overcoming their difficulties, including language, mathematics and science. Thanks to the presence of the psychologist, the displaced children and their families are helped to overcome the trauma of violence and exile, as well as their current state of uncertainty in Lebanon. From an approach based on children's rights, considering primary and urgent needs, the children grow up in a safe and supportive environment where they can express themselves freely, have psychosocial support, learn and develop skills for their future autonomy. The Fratelli Project therefore represents a long-term investment in a better future for hundreds of refugees and vulnerable children.

## TECHNICAL TEAM ON SUSTAINABILITY VISITED THE MARIST DISTRICT OF ASIA

Within the framework of the sustainability project of the General Economato, in February, a strategic planning workshop and visit were held with the Marist District of Asia (MDA). The technical team that supports the District, from Brazil and the General Administration, and several brothers from the District of Asia participated in this project. The objective is that this planning will set the future direction for projects that can contribute to greater financial autonomy in the District. The Brothers of the District of Asia are present in Vietnam, Cambodia, India, Bangladesh, Thailand, and the Philippines.

We share below the summary of the work, written by Br. George Valle from Bangladesh, of the District's sustainability team.

Before I share the outcome of the recent visitation of the technical team, let me introduce the brothers and lay Marist behind the fruitful visits. I would like to start with the technical team. It is composed of Br. Goyo Linacero, from the General administration in Rome, Br. João Batista from Brazil Centro-Sul, Br. George Valle from MDA and Sergio Oliveira from Brazil Centro-Norte. And in MDA are Brothers Canisio Willrich, Jose Grande, Eugenio Sanz, Bao Xuan Joseph, Jiji Dhasan, John Hung and Le Hai. Majority of these brothers and lay, who are members of any of the teams mentioned above, were present in the 2-day face-to-face workshop while two brothers & one lay, due to valid reasons like time difference, health issues and hectic timetable, were able to participate in the sessions online only either in the morning or in the afternoon.



The Technical Team planned to visit the communities of Thailand, Cambodia, and Vietnam, from the 20th of February – the 4th of March 2023, and aimed to conduct a 2-day workshop on the formulation and validation of strategic plan, know the reality of each community and visit its mission projects as well as other sustainable projects of the diocese and other religious congregations within the diocese the community members are currently working. For the smooth flow of the planned activities and guidance of everyone involved, these objectives and other details related to it, were communicated, in advance, to the country coordinators and community leaders before the actual date of the visit came.

The 12-day visit started with a workshop on Strategic Planning held at St. Camillan Pastoral Center in Lat Krabang Bangkok, Thailand

on February 21 & 22. The first day was devoted to the revision and validation of the Vision-Mission statement, Strategic drivers, SWOT matrix & Strategic options with Sergio assisting the MDA team online. Prior to the formulation of the plan on the second day, Sergio invited Vanderlei Soela, a lay and principal in one of the brothers' schools in Brazil, to give a session on Strategic planning. During his talk, he made mention and singled out that the road to sustainability is a slow process and requires ample of time and above all, active participation from every brother & lay in the province or district. The sharing of his expertise in this matter paved and eased the proceeding and concluding session which was the elaboration of the strategic objectives and actions of the plan at the district level.

The District Council reviewed and validated the results of the workshop the following morning of the 23rd of February 23 and the materials were shared to all the communities visited except the Sector house & La Valla in Thailand. The succeeding steps to accomplish the plan will be done in the country and community level and is calendared between March and July of this year. The implementation hopefully will commence sometime in August as soon as it is completed, reviewed, and validated.

# MARISTS HELP POOR PEOPLE TO RECEIVE A GOOD EDUCATION IN TATUM



The Marist presence in Cameroon belongs to the Province of West Africa. There are four marist communities, working in 4 schools, two marist and two diocesan. The crisis in two English speaking Regions of Cameroon has affected education greatly. We share here a testimony of a student, Shakiratu Nyuykonghe, from St Pius school in Tatum which is a Catholic School run by the Marist Brothers with circa 298 students and 23 members of the staff.

This is my third year in St Pius school in Tatum which is a Catholic School run by the Marist Brothers. However, I have faced many challenges because I am a muslim. One good thing is that I have learned more about the Catholic faith and beliefs. I have also learned a lot about the Bible since I was more familiar with the Quran. To tell the truth, it has all been a good experience.

Through the Marist Brothers I have been helped financially with my school needs and it is my wish that I may be assisted again in the coming years. It has been a wonderful experience for me, and I promise to repay this favour by studying hard, helping my parents with house chores, helping my friends who aren't as intelligent as I am



with their studies and above all being respectful to my teachers and elders since this is the least I can do at this level. In future, I may be blessed with the means to assist other persons in the society. As of now, I can only pray that God may bless and protect all those who are helping me and other students with fees and didactic materials.

In my school there are students of different religious beliefs and family backgrounds and characters very different from mine and some-times strange. As such it is sometimes not very easy to relate

with them, but my parents taught me to always respect everyone, be friendly but avoid bad and destructive friendships. So, I have decided to make friends with those who study hard and know why they are in school.

Another great challenge of my school life is the current sociopolitical crisis in our two English speaking Regions of Cameroon which has affected education greatly. Many schools have been destroyed, students and teachers attacked and some killed. Though our own school has never gone through this type of trial, I still feel scared every day. I keep praying that God will give us peace and protection in these regions so that all students and teachers may operate in a free environment. I equally pray that God may have mercy on those who have lost their lives and receive their souls in His Kingdom.



As it is said, some disappointments can turn into blessings. We do not have enough teachers, but I enjoy the fact that for three years we have been dealing with almost the same set of teachers with whom we are familiar and because of that, we understand them better. This has helped me to understand my lessons better. However, I fear that the few teachers available may be put under the stress of working within the crisis for long and dealing with increasing number of students as many more students keep coming to school.

To conclude, it is really a good experience to be a student and especially in a Catholic School. I pray and wish that my brothers and sisters who have refused coming to school and doing nothing at home may change and enjoy this advantage. I also pray that God may send many more persons of goodwill.

## MARIST SOLIDARITY INTERNATIONAL NETWORK FROM NETWORKING TO “NETBEING”

“Interdependence, rather than isolation or independence, must be the new normal for us. We will be witnesses of unity and hope.”  
(XXII General Chapter)

One of the main initiatives being developed, at the level of the whole Marist Institute, is the creation and consolidation of networks. Thus, we respond to the invitation of our last General Chapter to “build networks of Marist mission [...] that foster [...] our education and evangelization”. In this way, we have seen the consolidation of the networks of universities, of Provincial Coordinators of Volunteers, of Schools... Concrete steps have also been taken for the development of networking in solidarity: the Marist Solidarity International Network (MSIN).

From 23 February to 2 March, the MSIN held meetings in each of the 5 Working Groups that make up the network (Education in/for Solidarity – 23 February -, Social Works – 27 February -, NGOs/ Foundations – 28 February -, Ecology – 1 March – and Children’s Rights – 2 March -). It was an opportunity to meet at the level of the whole Institute, with the participation of about 60 Marists from the 6 Regions of the Institute. These five Working Groups have been functioning since the second Assembly of the RMSI, meeting every 3 months. Normally we meet in two sub-groups, one in Spanish/Portuguese and the other in English/French. This makes it easier for us to meet, as we do not need translators, as well as meeting times. On this occasion, the meetings were held jointly, with the aim of getting to know each other and sharing the path that each group is following, and thus continuing to build bridges. The aim of these meetings is not only to get together, but to continue to grow as an Institute and as a charismatic family, so that we can be closer to those who are the main recipients of our mission, the children and young people, particularly the most needy and vulnerable.

A process of work, and of life, which we believe must pass through four successive and complementary stages.

1. As a Marist Institute, we have spoken, and we continue to do so, about the riches that networks bring us: NET-TALKING. Not only has the Marist world discovered the richness of networking, but there are many documents and areas of our world, and of the Church, where this theme is highlighted. Pope Francis himself reminds us of the importance of this theme and invites us to focus “only on forms of mutual help between individuals or small groups” (FT 126).
2. The next step, which is already reflected in several areas, is to enhance working together, sharing good practices, organizing initiatives: NET-WORKING. Work organized together with others, within the Marist world, and also with external partners from civil society and other ecclesial entities. This is what



- the Rule of Life (RL 79) reminds us of when it says: “Encourage teamwork and cooperation”.
3. In this way, links are created that lead us to discover, know and empathize with those who live in a Marist key: “NET-LIVING”. A Marist key that brings us closer to the communion of life, also with the planet and with those who inhabit it. The Pope, in the encyclical *Laudato Si* (LS 209), challenges us to create “community networks” that lead us to an ecological and communitarian conversion.
4. These are the steps that we must take, together, to reach one of the ideals that we have set for ourselves, “BEING a Global Family”: NET-BEING. As Marists, in solidarity, we aspire to be a living portrait of the Good Samaritan for our neighbours in need.

### Institute of the Marist Brothers General House
