Star messenger

Dear Brothers

You may recall that last week I wrote about the need for Word and Eucharist to be at the centre of our fraternal life.

I return to that theme today. The Emmaus story was last Sunday's Gospel. What does it tell us? Two essential things. First, that the disciples found their "hearts burning" within them as Jesus talked and opened the Scriptures to them as they walked along. Secondly, it was when "He took bread, gave thanks, broke it and began to give it to them" that "their eyes were opened and they recognised Jesus". Emmaus captures the profound significance of Word and Eucharist for the followers of Jesus. Both bring Jesus to us. Both strengthen our faith. Both help create bonds of unity.

I'd like to focus on the place of the Word in our communities. We pray in community, and the prayers vary in style, length and engagement. That is our reality. However, I believe that we should take more time to ponder the Word of God together, and to share our thoughts, experiences and reactions.

The importance of this was brought home to me during a conversation the Steering Committee had before last year's Chapter with Bishop Tim Norton SVD. We asked Tim, who has done much work in cross-cultural awareness, to speak with us about ways we could help create inter-cultural sensitivity. From his experience, he suggested that one of the most powerful ways of achieving this within a community was to share the Word. He explained that deliberately structuring opportunities to listen to, ponder and share the Word together helps to build and strengthen fraternity. A major reason for this is that in sharing our response to the Word, we share ourselves. It takes us into our lives, our experiences, our faith. We share parts of ourselves that we don't

when sitting around watching television or working in the kitchen. In sharing our thoughts on the Word and the prayers that flow from it, we are expressing our inner hopes and desires in the context of our faith. Sharing the Word builds unity.

Pondering the Word is literally foundational for members of Religious Institutes. St John Paul II's Apostolic Exhortation on the Consecrated Life and its Mission, *Vita Consecrata*, tells us that:

"The Word of God is the first source of all Christian spirituality... Founders and foundresses were inspired by these texts in accepting their vocation and in discerning the charism and mission of their Institutes...Meditation of the Bible in common is of great value. When practised according to the possibilities and circumstances of life in community, this meditation leads to a joyful sharing of the riches drawn from the word of God, thanks to which brothers or sisters grow together and help one another to make progress in the spiritual life". To share the Word is not only to nurture our own faith, but to also exercise our responsibility to support and assist our Brothers on their own journey of faith.
