Conflicts and growth [48]

Wherever people live together, tensions and conflicts arise. This is no less true in a Marist community. Learn to speak with your brothers in a manner that is open and transparent. Doing so will strengthen unity and help you to overcome difficulties. (R.26.56)

Letter from a brother:

I read between the lines, from the letter sent to me by a brother. The great pain that the hurtful words of a confrere from his community had caused him. "Your first mission is to be a brother, and promote brotherhood." Says the rule of life. How to get along with this ideal presented for our Marist style of life and the verbal expressions that speak of another kind of relationship, not friendship but enmity...for the wounded brother, life changes; he does not feel welcomed in his community, he has lost his dignity, his confidence, his desire to continue living in that "place" and He has asked to leave the project and return to his country...

<u>Remember also that refusing to listen to ideas that make you uncomfortable will not</u> <u>resolve the matter.</u> Moving in that direction might serve only to impoverish everyone or damage, above all, whomever is most vulnerable at the time.

Never cease reminding yourself that community is a grace of the Spirit (cf Eph 4:2-6). We have come together without choosing one another; **welcome each other as a gift from the Lord.** Remain united in his name, despite your difficulties (cf Jn 17:11-12).

Just some days ago I returned from visiting some communities in Bangladesh and India and I saw the same situation in some places ... lack of acceptance and dialogue...so closed in their criteria that communion between the members of the community cannot be expected...

They speak the minimum and no feelings are expressed, the minimum and irrelevant information is given without opening the heart because it is known that it will not be accepted but once again it will be criticized and humiliated, treated as an idiot for having asked a question or for expressing his way of thinking about different situations.

Contemplating the table of La Valla [54]

"BROTHER, the table at La Valla is an icon of our Marist fraternity, <u>a powerful symbol</u> of the communion that exists among diverse cultures, peoples and personalities. To this table, we bring our human stories, as well as our concerns, convictions, and dreams. At this table, we share the bread of our lives, blessed by our common faith in Jesus, whom we follow in the way of our Good Mother, Mary. In choosing to sit at this table, you and I help each other to become the person that God has called us to be.

<u>From this table, we set forth to witness to God's love for all people</u>, especially children and young people who are most vulnerable"

Humiliated, and excluded without the possibility of being listened because his word does not count... expressing internal pain is hard to express and sometimes only tears of loneliness and rejection communicate what they feel in those situations.

Last eight months I stayed in Spain for health reasons. It was a new experience in my life. He enriched us with his personal qualities and skills; his enthusiasm and dynamism. He entered in contact with many people and he helped in many ways to the hostel boys in the classes and activities. We wish him the best in his studies and future mission in Go Vap Student House Community of Vietnam. Bro. Alex stayed with us some days, before travelling to Tamil Nādu to celebrate his Religious Profession's Silver Jubilee. Also, Bro. Michael stay in our Marist Community learning Bengali and on June, 24th he travelled to Sri Lanka, after he got the missionary visa to Bangladesh. Bro. Manoj and Augustin will stay in our community some months while they study the College's first year, They are studying in the Netaji Subhas Chandra Bose Open University of Burdwan. Manoj is studying Comerce and Augustin History. The Sundays we don't cook and we eat with the Hostel boys. They enjoy our presence and relation. Every day, after supper, we enjoy our community time playing cards and doing fun. On 3, July we received the good news of the appointment of the new bishop for our Diocese of Asansol, Fr. Elias Frank. Next day, some priests and religious welcomed him in the Pastoral Centre of Chetana. On July, 6th. Brother Jiji returned from Rome to our Community. He stayed one month doing the course Gier for the Brothers that did the perpetual profession last years.

About the hostel, to say that the boys had long summer holidays because the hight temperatures and they stay in the hostel studying and doing different activities. Now, they go normally to the school. Next days will come Cristina and Elena from Spain. They will stay one month helping us in the hostel activities.

Last June, Bro. Malangmei started the Community College mini-project in four Santali villages with the collaboration of FMSI and the funding of Misean Cara. The idea is to organize this activity in another two new villages. We help the boys/girls with two hours of class every day.

The Marist Community follows a sustainability plan taking care of a farm with chickens and ducks. The farm produce eggs every day and it contributes to sustain the economy of the community.

The new Marist House is almost built. In May was a strong cyclone and part of the roof was destroyed. Now the roof is complete and the electricians and painters are completing their work.



Giasnogor School Community Highlights, Moulovibazar, Sylhet, Bangladesh



The month of April was still within the Ramadan holidays and it kicked off with Marti attending the 4-day Moulovibazar Headmasters' New Curriculum Training Program 2023 at the oldest Gov't High School in the district that was established in 1891. According to him, he was the only foreigner, the oldest and supposedly not qualified anymore. However, many were pleased and appreciative of his presence. And as a proof of this appreciation, he was compensated with a sum of 6,800 taka (62 USD) like any other local headmasters, as an honorarium and food allowance for complying with the required training. The overwhelming joy in the face of Marti was so evident when he received the amount. This episode reminded George of his own experience, when he directly received, for the first time in his life as a teaching brother, 2000 taka (18 USD/month) in the mission parish of Pirgacha under Mymensingh diocese. Several brothers, including him, collaborated with Holy Cross Fathers or CSC as teachers in their Secondary High school for more than 6 years.



The proceeding days of the week kept the brothers together with the Smsm sisters Janet Ninipua and Ruma Gomes as well as the incoming novice Shuvo Chiran, who was on a community experience, busy preparing for the Holy week Triduum services. The Parish priest of Srimongol Fr. James Shemol, CSC, in the previous parish clergy-religious gathering, assigned them in three villages near Giasnogor. Fr. Robert Nokrek, CSC, the assistant parish priest in blue short-sleeve-shirt in the picture, gave the orientation couple of days prior to the scheduled dates of the communion services at the brothers' house.

Sr. Janet and Shuvo went to Meertinga, around 20 minutes away by car or CNG while Marti and Sr. Ruma took care of Kalachora, 30 minutes away and Zereen, an hour. Vigilio was still on home leave 'til the 30th while George was in Shimulia, Khulna diocese following up the two incoming young men for the Aspirancy program 2023.

In this country, the month of May and October are dedicated to the Blessed Virgin Mother Mary. Holy Rosaries and Pilgrimages are the frequent religious or spiritual exercises performed during these months among Catholic families and other Christian faithful. The visit of Juan Castro was indeed timely. He did not just meet the brothers in Giasnogor School and Mymensingh formation communities and their apostolates from the 7th to the 20th but also got the firsthand experience on how mixed, local & foreign, style or manner of Marian devotions are done in this part of Asia. Marti took advantage of his visit and requested him to give a brief talk about the painting of our Lady of Guadalupe given to him by the provincial of Juan when he attended the Champagnat Marist Schools Network meeting in Mexico. Sr. Ruma Gomes, smsm was the translator.









Towards the end of May, Marti and George had several meetings with the teachers usually after their last period in the afternoon. The purpose of which was to organize an information drive on the life of the founder among students and teachers. It was done through a quiz bowl competition in preparation for the Champagnat day on the 6th of

June as well as the closure and continuity of the Marist Vocation year. Since the auditorium cannot accommodate all the students at once plus having it in an open court is just impossible due to the scorching heat of the sun, so the contest was divided into two levels.

Level 1 is composed of class 6 & 7 while level 2 is made up of class 8, 9 & 10. The bowl was made up two parts namely: Spelling for the easy part and question & answer for the difficult part. Teachers were provided with booklets and brochures on the brief history St. Marcellin's life as the source of their information. Series of orientation on the mechanicals of the competition were held as well. Final rehearsal of the officials involved in the contest was done a day before the 6th.



The Champagnat day celebration at St. Marcellin School campus bustled with various activities. The day started with a mass for Christian and Catholic students, teachers, parents and friends. It was followed by round 1 of ballgames for class 6 & 7 and quiz bowl for class 8, 9 & 10. Round 2 was just a reverse of the round 1 but after a short break with free snacks for everyone. Prizes were awarded right after the competition. Everyone went home a winner and equally received the same awards of one pen, a pack of biscuit and unlimited fresh and cool water from the tap.



A day after the Champagnat day, George resumed his vocation follow ups on the 7 young men, recommended by the two young brothers Robert and Topu, 1st novice Shuvo Chiran and aspirant Timash, for the Aspirancy & candidacy program. He accompanied first the lone incoming aspirant Josh James Mondol, who was on a three-day community experience the 4th to the 8th of June, back to his parish in Shimulia under Khulna diocese then proceeded to Mymensingh diocese that is 6-7 hours night trip by bus. So far, he visited 5 of the 7 incoming candidates, 4 from Mymensingh diocese and 1 from Dhaka. The last two, who are related to each other will be visited hopefully on the first week of next month.

After the canonical year, you know that the novices are invited to do a three-monthministry experience. As it is specified in the Guide of formation: **"This period of apostolic activity should deepen the novice's understanding of our Marist mission and our apostolic spirituality."** (Guide of Formation No. 266). They are 8 novices in the second year. Three of them went to our school Maris Stella at Negombo (one at the campus of Thimbirigaskatuwa), two in our community at Kalpitiya and three at the Daya Mina Center of the Charity Sisters at Colombo. It is a center for young persons "differently abled." I let them to share about their experience.

Our ministry with children

We arrived there on June 11. The first night, we ate supper with sisters as well as participated in evening prayer. The next morning, we joined them for morning prayer and breakfast at nine o'clock.

When we got to Daya Mina on June 12, we officially started our ministry. We simply accompany students while



learning how to interact with them. Since their circumstances are so dissimilar from one another, we make an effort to comprehend each of them. As a result, we simply follow whatever the teacher has planned to teach the students each day, assisting the instructor in noticing when a student is having trouble writing, drawing, or otherwise expressing themselves. We mostly assisted them with the handwork that their teacher had assigned to them, such as making rug materials. Because of how difficult it is for us to comprehend one another when we communicate in another language, there are occasions when we feel challenged. On the other hand, we also give communion in the church every Sunday, we occasionally attend mass and assist the Father in giving Communion after being invited to do.



Our Daily Routine

Our, time spent living in a community with our Brothers Ky, Manecas, and Ruben has been wonderful because everything is done together. We spend time together making jokes and telling amusing stories, especially at dinnertime or after we get home from school. This is how we unwind. We also shared our struggles in class with one another and did our best to help each other find solutions that we felt were best for us.



Our Community Prayer

We three agreed that because we had morning and evening prayers, we would take turns leading the prayers for a week. So, we had adoration with the sisters on Sunday. We attend mass every Tuesday, Wednesday, Friday, and Sunday and we don't do evening prayer thereafter.

2. Didemo at Thimbirigaskatuwa (campus 2 of our Maris Stella School)

I share when I arrived in the school being in contact with students. They are grade 8. I was really excited and amused with them. It was a good experience for me while I was standing up in front of them to teach English.

By the way, I was really enjoying with her lessons. Because she is a very good teacher and I found her methods and techniques teaching are inspired me too. When I was participating in her class. Some photos I took from the grade 3 when I have the spare time. I used this time to participate and to get to know them as well. They were very happy and excited to welcome me with the smile faces. And then, I did some activities such as games and animated with them as well. I am feeling happy and humoristic with the students.



Two weeks ago, we had celebrated the Feast Day of Macellin at school. The school was invited one of the diocese priests came to celebrate a mass. The same time we also had the procession of our Lady around the school and the students were showing their band music to animate it. Brother Mervin Perera the one who is the principal in this school. I am staying with the five brothers in the community. I was feeling very happy and comfortable to live with them. I would like to say that this community I felt at home.







3. Cuong (and Eddy) at Kalpitiya

With only a few days left to complete a month, I left the novitiate and went to another community. Here everything is different from the people, the language, the skin color and the culture. We were greeted with a simple meal, living poverty in the community. So far, I feel happy and meaningful with the work I'm doing. First Study- we have three classes every day with the Brothers. Br. Kiko about Marist Studies, Br. Real Religious life & Constitution and Br. Rod Scripture & Theology. Every Brother give us assignments and before the class we have opportunity to correct our assignment with them.

Second apostolic work, we are involved with different congregations for the apostolic work in three groups. It's a good way to improve our teaching skill and prepare ourselves for the future. Though we are foreigners, but we are able to manage with the local students and it's a good sign that we are able to work in with other cultures.

Third Manual work. It is an activity for us, where we can involve ourselves, learn something from others, do something for our community and show our Love. Gardening (flower, banana and vegetable), cleaning house, painting, compost, planting trees are the examples of our manual work. It is good physical work that keep us in good health; we should do it every day. Through this we can develop our work skills.

Brothers are always encouraging us in many ways, especially study and prayer life (community and personal).

Embracing the Marist Cultural Pilgrimage of Hope as a Volunteer

"Persons always live in relationship. We come from others, we belong to others, and our lives are enlarged by our encounter with others" - Pope Francis

When the Atlantis Marist International Community in South Africa closed in November 2022 and the new Marist International Community in Malawi took longer to open, I was given a new opportunity. My journey began when Brother Jose Willrich Canisio, the Superior of the Marist

District of Asia (MDA), welcomed me and informed me that I would be joining the Pailin Marist Community in Cambodia.



I was all set to begin my new mission in Pailin in early February 2023. Despite various adjustments to the departure dates and a difficult experience at Manila airport, I finally flew to Ho Chi Minh City on February 25, 2023. Upon arrival, I had a quick meeting with Brother Kim Dong Reol, MDA's volunteer coordinator. I traveled to Siem Reap the next day and spent three days there. After exhausting and sleepless nights of travel, exploring the gorgeous Angkor Wat and walking the streets at night gave me a rejuvenating experience.





On March 2, 2023, I was enthusiastically welcomed by the Pailin community. Brothers Hoang Anh and Le Hai from Vietnam, Bernhard Tremmel from Germany, Gustavo from Spain, and Pierre Joseph from Madagascar were among the members of the community. I also had the pleasure of meeting the lively boys and girls staying at the hostel, who warmly refer to me as "sister" (Bang Srey) in the Khmer language.

This form of address gave me a sense of peace, and I am gradually becoming accustomed to it. I was introduced to the kind-hearted people in the parish and the surrounding community. I also had the opportunity to visit the LaValla School in Phnom Penh, where I met other Marists. It was heartening to see how the Marist Brothers and staff were helping disadvantaged youngsters through education and skills

training programs. I reminisced about my extraordinary experience at the Emmanuel Daycare for Special Needs Children in Atlantis, South Africa as I visited the facilities of the school.

People in Cambodia are naturally friendly, even if communicating with them can be difficult due to their lack of English skills. I admire their tranquility and their humble way of life. However, the sweltering summer heat presents a huge difficulty for me. There were days when I preferred not to go outside, and the hot nights made sleeping impossible.

My roles and responsibilities include empowering teachers at the Marist Education Center (MEC) and aiding them in improving their teaching and communication skills. I also teach English to high school students from public schools at the MEC and provide English lessons to a





student in the hostel.

The students in the hostel are not only helpful but also exceptionally polite. These experiences are inculcating in me the values of simplicity, humility, and modesty.

In terms of planning, it might be better that in the morning, the brother having the experience can work in the workshop with the workers. And in the afternoon, he can visit or push wheelchairs to be with other people who are not able to walk.
