Dear Brothers

Those of you who know the writings of Richard Rohr OFM, will undoubtedly be aware of the Order – Disorder – Re-order paradigm. He has referred to this in several of his books, most recently in The Wisdom Pattern (2020).

Rohr argues that through history, a universal pattern can be found in societies, spiritualities, philosophies and life. It's seen in the changing seasons, the rise and fall of civilisations, Biblical stories and sacred myths, and, for Christians, most clearly in the paschal mystery – the life, death and resurrection of Jesus. We find it in our own personal lives. He claims that growth and development occur by passing beyond some perfect order through an often painful and, at times, seemingly unnecessary disorder or chaos, to an enlightened reorder or resurrection. This is the universal pattern that connects and solidifies our relationships with everything around us. Rohr writes:

"The trajectory of transformation and growth, as I see the great religious and philosophical traditions charting it, uses many metaphors for this pattern. We could point to the classic "Hero's Journey" charted by Joseph Campbell; the Four Seasons or Four Directions of most Native religions; the epic accounts of exodus, exile, and Promised Land of the Jewish people, followed by the cross, death, and resurrection narrative of Christianity. Each of these deeply rooted "myths," in its own way, is saying that growth happens in this full sequence. To grow toward love, union, salvation, or enlightenment, we must be moved from Order to Disorder and then ultimately to Reorder".

He stresses the need to see this process as a unity: "Order, by itself, normally wants to eliminate any disorder and diversity creating a narrow and cognitive rigidity in both people and systems. Disorder, by itself, closes us off from any primal union, meaning, and eventually even sanity in people and systems. Reorder, or transformation of people and systems, happens when both are seen to work together".

Understanding and embracing this pattern can give us hope in difficult times and the courage to push through disorganisation, and even great chaos, to find a new way of being in the world. This is also akin to childbirth. The final stage of pregnancy- labor- is the most dangerous and most painful. In fact, the medical term is "transition". While this can feel like 'dying' it is the necessary stage that precedes new life.

Transformation is at the heart of the spiritual journey or search for God. All the Mystics know this; we all know it. John of the Cross refers to the dark night.

In an obscure night Fevered with love's anxiety (O hapless, happy plight!) I went, none seeing me Forth from my house, where all things quiet be

He speaks of a process of enlightenment which takes us from the comfort of the senses or home, through darkness to union with the hidden God.

Rohr reminds us that "only the whole self is ever ready for the whole God, so reorder always involves moving beyond the dualistic mind towards a more expansive, contemplative knowing. This is what the Buddhists call 'enlightenment'."

In all these situations, dislocation and discontinuity are essential. It is a painful path- because it takes us away from the known and the comfortable. None of us really want to encounter difficulties or pain, but life tells us it is the way to transformation and the new

order. As Rohr writes: "to arrive at the reorder stage, we must endure, learn from, and include the disorder stage, transcending the first naive order, but also still including it".

When we look at the Church today, we are at some point in the disorder phase: there isn't a clear vision for



the future. Pope Francis offers a pathway through synodality; others are resistant. Progressive elements push one way; conservatives pull another. We don't know what will emerge, but we need to believe that the future, the reordered Church, will respond to the world as equally and effectively as it did in the past order.

Sociologically, a similar three stage journey is also used in reference to community formation: the new community gathers, it goes through a period of difficulty as people debate arrangements, find their place and adjust, and this leads to a phase when matters are settled, norms are established, and life is harmonious. This is the *form, storm, norm* dynamic. Undoubtedly, it's similar in marriage and close relationships; working or personal.

In fact, it's what we, in our Institute and Province, are experiencing now. We had decades of order and stability. We know we are in a period of disorder. In the Province, we've spoken about the current time as a transitionary period: we are moving from what was, to what will be, but without being fully conscious of what the future will be. We are truly navigating unknown waters. The 'new' that emerges will have elements of the past, but will be different and will include what we have learned along the journey.

Fr Rohr suggests that we are 'saved' by knowing and surrendering to this universal pattern of reality. Knowing the full pattern allows us to let go of our first order, trust the disorder, and, sometimes even hardest of all—to trust the new reorder. Three big leaps of faith for all of us!

So, Brothers, let's maintain our faith that Champagnat Marist life and mission will emerge in the future, vibrant, healthy, reordered!
