

MARIST PEDAGOGY: From a Psychological Lens (10)

Today, we take our investigation of Mary's personality profile a notch further to her openness to experiences, one of the personality factors proposed by McCrae and Costa. The theorists express that "people high on openness are generally creative, imaginative, curious, and liberal and have a preference for variety. By contrast, those who score low on openness to experience are typically conventional, down-to-earth, conservative, and lacking in curiosity" (Theories of Personality, p392). Where do we conveniently place the Blessed Virgin Mary on the openness trait scale?

We learn a great deal from the Lukan Gospel, the disposition of Mary to the Angel Gabriel's message. The first chapter of Luke presents us with the complete discourse between the Divine messenger and the human recipient. Interestingly, we note the utmost openness of the maiden, Mary. She is understandably baffled by Angel's message yet listens with rapt attention. She questions the possibility of the seemingly incomprehensible message for clarification and not in the spirit of doubt. Though she does not sufficiently understand, she welcomes it with faith. How do we know?

Ultimately, she gives her fiat, "Behold, I am the servant of the Lord; let it be to me according to your word" (Lk. 1:38). We should bear in mind that Mary is fully conscious of the fact that conception is impossible without a man. Thus, she asks, "How can this be since I do not know a man?" So, the Blessed Virgin Mary's eventual approval sets her up for a great experience. Many questions could run through our minds. Is her fiat not challenging the established biological convention or makeup? Is she also not putting to test the stringent Jewish marriage customs? Is she not so courageous to welcome this invitation? In sum, Mary daringly demonstrates extraordinary openness to new life reality.

What's more? Mary is very open to the Angel (or the Holy Spirit) that she believes the additional information — "Even Elizabeth, your relative, is going to have a child in her old age, and she who was said to be unable to conceive is in her sixth month" (Lk. 1:36) - the Angel supplies. Mary could disregard this information: Elizabeth's pregnancy should be headline news considering its nature. For six months, how couldn't she hear about it? Because of her open spirit, she still receives the message with warmth. Notwithstanding, the Virgin's intuitive and imaginative character leads her to discover that, in her old age, she might need some helping hand. So, as recorded by the holy book, she goes to assist her kinswoman in the remaining period of her pregnancy.

We also turn to one Marian feast - the Presentation of the Blessed Virgin Mary - to understand her tremendous openness


to God's message. This is based on an ancient tradition that says Mary was taken to the Temple in Jerusalem when she was 3 years old and dedicated to God. In response, Mary placed her whole self at the service of God. From this ancient tradition, we evaluate that the Blessed Virgin Mary is oriented from her childhood to be a handmaid at the Temple. To render a befitting service to her Lord, she is to be open and attuned to her environment. This childhood orientation might have developed in Mary the fine disposition of openness to different experiences.

Again, we soberly contemplate Mary's desperate experience in Bethlehem to see her openness to experience. She could have birthed her baby on the verandah of the landlord or elsewhere. However, she chooses not to. She accepts her new reality and thinks outside the square. She creatively prepares a space for her newborn child in the manger, an event that has become a mystery to unravel and a historic milestone. This is a vast departure from the convention. Not many people would make such a decision. In this simple act, we observe a profound exhibition of her liberality and creativity.

On the other hand, on the openness' low score, the Blessed Virgin Mary could be described as conventional. We may observe this disposition from the presentation of the child Jesus at the temple. The scripture testifies that she faithfully attends to the Jewish laws and precepts regarding days of confinement, offerings, etc. She does not rock the boat. Yet one more example, at age 12, Mary takes Jesus to a religious celebration in Jerusalem, where the boy eventually goes missing. We read that she observes this festival frequently. Though conservative, as identified here and in many instances of her life, she was not limited by it. Perhaps, Mary was conventional with faith matters which possibly endeared her to God. In conclusion, based on our evaluation, we say with some certainty that the Blessed Virgin

- 3. Prize award ceremony to deserving students in various Domains of school life.



The celebration ended with lunch at 4:00 p.m


