The meeting of the International Commission Brothers Today began on Monday in the General House and will continue until Saturday. Organized by the directors of the Hermanos Hoy Secretariat, brothers Ángel Medina and Lindley Sionosa, and the participation of Brother João Carlos do Prado, General Councilor.

On Monday and Tuesday, Brother Ángel Diego, director of the Solidarity Secretariat, participated virtually in the meeting of the board of directors of the BICE.

The permanent formation team of the Institute, brothers Ataíde José de Lima, Michael Sexton and Xavier Barceló, are in Florianópolis, Brazil Centro-Sul, to accompany the course "Spirituality of the Heart", aimed at brothers and lay people who speak Portuguese and Spanish. The course began on Wednesday and will end on February 24. Brother Óscar Martín, General Councilor, accompanies the group during the first three days, until Friday.

On Tuesday, Br. Ángel Diego, from the Secretariat of Solidarity, participated in the first session of the Rights Training Course for the Brothers of Africa, which takes place online. Until Wednesday he was in Geneva, where he met with partners of the Institute's solidarity projects and followed some UN initiatives.

On Thursday, the meeting of the Commission preparing MIMA III, which will be held in Spain in April, takes place online.

From Thursday to Saturday, Brother Ernesto Sánchez, Superior General, will participate in the events celebrating the V anniversary of the "Ciao" Center of Syracuse, a project of the LaValla200> international community.

Next Sunday, the "New Builders of the Hermitage" course begins in Manziana. Brother Ernesto and other brothers from the Council and the General House will participate in the inauguration. ses, and this in every Region, especially in those who need it most..." said José Antonio Rosa Lemus, mission director of the Europe Region.

The group, under the coordination of the Vicar General, Br. Luis Carlos Gutiérrez focused on the world's situation in the post-pandemic era and analyzed ideas and intuitions

for the Marist mission at the global and local levels.

To Brother Francis Jumbe, from Malawi, Southern Africa Province, "it has been an enriching week, sharing experiences from the different regions and from the Secretariats. It was an opportune time to sit around the same table to appreciate the significant efforts being made in the area of mission especially after the post-Covid pandemic and, in a spirit of discernment, aiming to go beyond with God in ministering to those that need our care the most".

Ideas and insights for Marist mission at the global and local levels

Several topics related to the context of the Marist mission were discussed. On the first day, Br. Ernesto Sanchez, Superior General, considering his participation in the synodal assembly, presented to the participants some pastoral perspectives derived from the Synod. The participants then reflected on the sustainability and structures of the mission, the processes that the networks are triggering in the Institute, the care of people, volunteering, children's rights, and the creation of innovation, among others. "During these days we have become aware of the diversity of Marist realities to contain them, interconnect them, articulate them, and take care of them. It is our task to animate the Mission from each Secretariat and region of the Institute and to strengthen the work in Networks with creativity, innovation, and empathy. Some premises that accompanied us in our shared work: embracing the space for listening, taking care of people, and striving for the vitality and viabi-

lity of the Mission in our actions", noted Analía Ruggeri, from Argentina (<u>Cruz del Sur</u>), who represents the Solidarity Network.

All reflection was oriented towards considering reality, placing the Gospel at the center, and trying to find an answer to the question that constantly accompanies the journey of the General Government: "What we are called to be and to do".

Global Charismatic Family

The General House welcomed the participants, highlighting the spirit of Family. Br. Kevin Wanden, from New Zealand, Province of <u>Star of the Sea</u>, presented that ambience: "The friendly greeting you receive at the airport sets the tone for your stay at the General House. The community and staff are always so friendly, with a cheery, 'Buongiorno', you know immediately you are welcome as part of the Marist family. They are always asking how you are getting on and if you need anything, going out of their way to assist with any request. The third-floor community room is a wonderful asset. The Brothers have created a tangible sense of fraternity. You get a real experience of being part of a global family despite the limitations of language".

He was born in 1972 and known among the brothers as "Beto", studied at the Colegio Champagnat school in Bogotá, Colombia, his hometown.

He began his postulancy in 1989 in the city of Popayán and made his novitiate in Medellín. He professed his first vows in 1991 and made his perpetual profession in 1997.

Br. Beto has a degree in religious sciences from the Pontifical University of Salamanca, Spain, and in social sciences from the Pontifical Gregorian University in Rome. He also holds a Master's degree in Disciplinary Development Studies from the Universidad de Los Andes in Colombia. Currently pursuing a PhD in Education at PUC Rio Grande do Sul, Brazil, with a research project on global citizenship.

He has worked as an educator in the Champagnat schools of Ipiales and Pasto, as vice-rector of the schools of lpiales, Pasto and Villavicencio, as provincial coordinator of youth ministry, as secretary of solidarity of the province and as delegate of the provincial in Colombia. He has been a member of the Team of the New Models of animation, management and governance of the General Administration (2014-2016). In 2016, when he was provincial councilor and bursar of the Colombia sector of the province, he was appointed director of the Secretariat for Education and Evangelization, a position he held until December 2022. He is currently part of the Manizales community.

THE IMPACT OF ARTIFICIAL INTELLIGENCE ON EDUCATION

he digital world is changing the way we learn and teach and has been present in Marist educational activities for some time now. Now that artificial intelligence (AI) is taking center stage, it is necessary to analyze its implications for education and the Marist mission. One of the most eloquent expressions in dayto-day AI is ChatGPT. Regarding this issue, the Marist Region of



<u>Europe</u> has published on its website an interview with Isaac Pinto Gismero, Coordinator of Technologies for Learning and Knowledge (TLK) of the <u>Marists of Ibérica</u>. Below, we reproduce the interview, where he explains what this application consists of and details the possible repercussions it could have in the educational field.

Isaac, what is ChatGPT?

ChatGPT is an application that allows us to communicate with Artificial Intelligence. Al is a part of computer science where we attempt to replicate human behaviours within a machine. One of the most significant areas within Al is machine learning. The machine not only follows the guidelines we provide (for example, moving a box from one place to another) but is capable of learning that when that box appears, it should be moved elsewhere. There is a deeper level of learning (Deep Learning), where machines can identify more complex concepts.

ChatGPT is an application that enables us to communicate with a Deep Learning Artificial Intelligence called GPT (Generative Pre-trained Transformer): it generates content, is pre-trained, and produces results through transformations.

How is ChatGPT used?

We ask ChatGPT to generate text with certain characteristics, and the application produces it based on its pre-existing knowledge. This knowledge, at the moment, encompasses all the information available on the Internet. Or, more precisely, all the information that was on the Internet until 2021. One issue is that if we ask for information it doesn't have (recent current affairs for instance), ChatGPT may create a response. It will never leave a blank space; it will develop the text requested with the information available or it will make it up if needed.

Who has access to this tool?

Anyone. It's a public and free application; <u>you just need to</u> <u>register with an email account</u>. The company that created ChatGPT, OpenAI (founded, among others, by Elon Musk, CEO of Twitter), has allowed anyone without knowledge on artificial intelligence to use it. The interface is very simple, like a chat.

What are the implications in our daily lives?

It's a new technology, and its possibilities are still being defined. The issue is that we run the risk of using this technology for any purpose without regulations. This is another problem; steps are being taken in the European Union and Spain to regulate Al use. However, there is no regulation yet. So, are we using it in society legally and ethically? It's a problem that still needs to be addressed. Some countries and companies are already restricting its use.

As far as we know now, this tool can help any worker, for example, in generating texts. Texts that used to take a lot of time and effort to write can now be generated in seconds. We need to consider the risk, as mentioned before, of whether the information is correct or not. My critical thinking and knowledge will have to analyse that document.

Furthermore, can I use that text as my own and publish it as such? If you ask ChatGPT who owns the intellectual property of the generated text, it will say it's its own. And if you ask under what conditions you can use it, it refers you to the OpenAI website, where those conditions are not yet clear.

We work in the educational field, Isaac, where besides workers, there are students, with families probably wondering: What does all this mean for a child's or teenager's learning process?

The application is available to anyone, including students. And here we face an important scenario. If a teacher assigns a "300-word essay about the first moon landing" as homework, there is a risk that ChatGPT might do it. Moreover, the student can ask the AI to write it using the language of a 13-year-old with three spelling mistakes.

For teachers, there are two alternatives: to limit the use of ChatGPT within the school or to use it as a pedagogical tool

to benefit from it. I would opt for the second option, incorporating it into the classroom. Students learn how to use this artificial intelligence, and they do it critically, which is the most significant aspect. We can use this Al to acquire 21st-century skills.

The provincial LKT coordination is reflecting on the uses of this program in the educational field. What exactly is being done?

For a few weeks now, we have formed a working group to study the use of Al in education. We have divided this process into two parts. <u>The first is focused on analysing and categorizing different Als</u> (not just text generators; <u>there are design</u>, <u>voice transcription</u>, <u>programming Als</u>, etc.). In this more technical part, we will study legal requirements, the technology behind it, and provide some small recommendations for its use.

In a second phase, another group of professionals from different educational stages, based on that categorization, will propose activities within the classroom. For example, a Language subject professional in secondary education may suggest how to use ChatGPT in the classroom. The goal is that we can use this tool safely and targeted towards education in the future.

SIRIA EARTHQUAKE IN ALEPPO: ONE YEAR LATER

quickly mobilized to provide essential aid to the local population.

" Half an hour after the earthquake, our doors were open to accommodate 1,000 people on the first day and 500 to 700 people on the following days. We offer them shelter, mattresses, blankets, hot meals, clothing, heating, electricity, but above all, our affection and a Marist heart." – Br. George Sabé

CHILE MARIST BOARDS OF DIRECTORS MEET TO DEFINE 2024 ACTION PLAN



ne hundred and twenty-one members of the Board of Directors (CODIS) of the twelve Marist schools and the Animation Areas of the <u>Chile Sector (Province of Santa</u> <u>María de los Andes</u>), met in Limache, from January 8 to 11, to share learning experiences in the light of the emphases of the Provincial Master Lines and to develop leadership and animation competencies that will strengthen Marist communities and works.

On the first day, the first module entitled "Marist Leaders Promoting Fraternal Communities" was discussed. Afterward, there was a spiritual retreat with the theme "The joy of meeting on the way", animated by the Marist Life team.

The second day focused on the analysis of data and information for the 2023 school year. The presentation panel was formed by Pedro Díaz, Claudio Arellano, Claudia González, Juan Pablo Valdivia, and Marcela Román, and Marcela Román, Ph.D. in Education from the Jesuit network. The panelists' presentation was followed by an Inter CODIS workshop. The second day's module focused on the analysis of data by school, carried out in groups by each Board of Directors. In the afternoon, all participants shared their projections, recommendations, lessons learned, and best practices throughout the year 2023. The third day was devoted to the construction of communities and the Action Plan for 2024. The day's work began with the module "Participating we build community". Participants included members of the Marist Youth Council and psychologist Andrea Iglesis. The second part of the morning was devoted to an analysis workshop focused on schools, led by members of the Marist Mission Team. In the afternoon, a second workshop entitled "Building the Future" was held, which consisted of the reflection, synthesis, and design of the 2024 Action Plan for each of the schools, and was developed by each Board of Directors.

On the last day, after the joint prayer, a workshop was held to prepare and reflect on the 2024 Action Plan for each school. In his speech, the Sector's Delegate for Life and Mission, Ernesto Reyes, made a presentation on the focuses and challenges for 2024.

Víctor Vidal, a member of the Pastoral and Mission team in Chile, emphasized the dedication of the Marist Youth Council members. He highlighted their interest in the Marist project and its importance within the Marist Youth Ministry Network. At the end of the day, CODI members also spoke about their mission, achievements, and challenges in the educational communities they lead.

The day concluded with a Eucharist, where gratitude was offered to the Father for all the experiences lived. Prayers were made to Saint Marcellin and the Good Mother, asking them to continue interceding to advance Champagnat's dream in all the Marist works in Chile.

BRASIL CENTRO-SUL MARIST VOCATIONS MEETING

rom January 18th to 21st, a Marist Vocations Meeting took place in Curitiba, Province of Brasil Centro-Sul. With the theme "life project and Marist mission", the activity brought together vocation seekers, Marist Brothers and Vocation Animators from the Province.Among the young people interested in the Marist vocation, there were seven people from Caçador, Curitiba, Criciúma, Dourados, Ponta Grossa and São Paulo. There were also six brothers present, as well as vocation animators. The meeting was coordinated by Brother Rafael Ferreira.

During the Marist Vocations Meeting, there were moments of formation, spirituality, conviviality and Marist immersion. The participants visited the Marist Memorial and exchanged experiences with the older brothers of the São José dos Pinhais Residence. Important themes for the young people's formation were addressed, such as self-knowledge, the life of Marcellin Champagnat and the Marist Mission and Life Project. On the last day of the meeting, individual conversations were held between the brothers and the vocational candidates about their vocational journeys. Brother Benê Oliveira, Provincial, highlighted the importance of the dynamic of accompaniment and vocational discernment. "Let's move forward in building a culture of vocations as the best response to the vocational frustration typical of our times; a modest and discreet response, but one that is well-disposed and effective, working on accompaniment and discernment to reach the hearts of young people. Numbers and results are important, but it is always God who takes the initiative, who loves and continues to call, choose, prepare and send!" he said.

"125 years ago, the first Marist brothers –


who were sent to Mexico – arrived to begin

But the most interesting thing is that they brought us the charisma of Marcellin, the one we have been living, the one we have been promoting, the one we have been trying to make known. Many have passed through our schools, many lay people, many brothers, of whom at this moment we are grateful. This is the first element for which we are celebrating this jubilee: 125 years of the presence of the Marist brothers in Mexico," said Brother Luiz Enrique, provincial of <u>Mexico Occidental</u>.

Another element of great joy for us is being able to celebrate the 100th anniversary of the birth of our dear brother Basilio Rueda, a universal brother, a brother for the world, for the Institute in general. In addition to his apostolate among us, he was elected superior general, and was the first non-French speaking superior, and he spent two periods as superior general, in a complex time for the church and for religious life, just after Vatican II, where he had to assume and accompany us on this journey. His legacy lives on among us," said Brother Luis Felipe, provincial of <u>Mexico Central</u>.

The online event was also marked by different tributes, dances, musicals, and presentations from various Marist educational institutions in Mexico.

"May we be aware of how in each city we have generated joyful, generous and committed Marist life," said Brother Sergio Cáceres, from Mexico Occidental.

After the launch of the Jubilee Year of Mexico (see video), which has as its motto "Gratitude, audacity and trust", the Marists have scheduled 3 other events:

- the commemoration of the arrival of the Marist Brothers to Mexico, on May 20
- the anniversary of the birth of Brother Basilio, October 16
- and the Closing of the Marist Jubilee Year, from December 26 to 31, with an Interprovincial Retreat.

125 years of the Marist presence in Mexico

The three pioneer brothers (Pedro Damián, Anselmo and Filogorino) arrived from France to Guadalajara on July 21, 1899. After their arrival, the Marist brothers began that same year a school course at the Inmaculada school. Most of the schools, at that time, were primary level. They also founded schools of arts and crafts, several boarding schools, four preparatory schools (which at that time was equivalent to secondary school), an itinerant missionary community and a publishing-printing press. From the beginning, the Marist brothers put faith in promotion of Marist vocations in Mexico, and established formation houses.

Currently, 125 years later, the Marists of Champagnat are present in 22 states of Mexico, they have 36,632 students, 3986 teachers and support staff, and they have 134 Marist educational works in the two provinces of Mexico, including preschool educational centers (12), primary schools (32), secondary schools (36), preparatory schools (30), universities

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(5), boarding schools (2), unschooling social works (13) and a formation house for brothers (4).

100 years of the Birth of Brother Basilio Rueda Guzmán

Brother Basilio was born on October 16, 1924 in Acatlán de Juárez, Mexico. From his youth he chose a path of service and embraced the Marist vocation, standing out for his dedication, wisdom, innovative spirit and spiritual depth. On September 24, 1967 he was elected Superior General and re-elected in 1976. For 18 years as superior general, he travelled through the five continents sowing hope, and invited the brothers to make possible the changes preached by the church at the Second Vatican Council. In a period of such turbulence, he travelled thousands of kilometers, preached hundreds of retreats, gave many conferences, conducted many surveys, wrote more than 2,500 pages of circulars, spiritually accompanied many Brothers and other people, and wrote more than 50,000 letters to priests, friends, former students and Brothers. His human experience was one of the richest, and that is why he became an authority to which people gladly turned. In 1986 he returned to Mexico and continued his work as a spiritual advisor and master of novices. He died on January 21, 1996.

FORMATION COLLOQUIUM: CARING FOR AND GENERATING MARIST LIFE IN ASIA-OCEANIA

rom January 22 to 25, 2023, Marist brothers from across the Regions of Asia and Oceania gathered at the Marist Asia Pacific Center (MAPAC) in the Philippines to participate in the Formation Colloquium. Based on the previous Colloquium in 2018, this event tried to go deeper into the heart of Marist life, focusing on the theme "Caring for Marist Life".

One of the primary goals of the Colloquium was to foster connections and build a network among the brothers engaged in formation to the Consecrated Marist Life



throughout the region. The importance of collaboration and support in Marist Formation was emphasized.

The meeting had 20 participants from the 2 Marist Regions (6 Brothers from the Province Star of the Sea, 5 Brothers from East Asia, 7 Brothers from Marist District of Asia, 2 Brothers from South Asia) and Brother Ángel Medina, Director of the Secretariat Brothers Today, from the General Administration. A key component of the Colloquium was the sharing of collective insights. Formators had the opportunity to share their experiences, challenges, and successes to young formators who are stepping into the formation stages.

Participants actively engaged in sharing the details of their respective formation programs, covering various stages of

the initial formation such as Vocational Animation, Aspirancy, Postulancy, Novitiate, and Post-Novitiate. This exchange not only facilitated mutual learning but also encouraged each administrative unit to develop and strengthen their formation initiatives, ensuring a consistent and impactful approach across the region.

The Colloquium concluded with a focus on the Asia-Oceania Formation Commission, exploring ways to enrich the vision of initial formation for the region. Discussions centered around the mission of the Marist Institute across Asia and Oceania, seeking to answer crucial questions: What does the mission look like in this diverse and dynamic region? What do we prepare the candidates for?



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
