KOBE COMMUNITY Japan

Hello everyone! Welcome to the Kobe Community. I will share with you the highlights of our 2023 and a glimpse of each brother's life.

Last April 2023, three of our brothers got sick with COVID-19. Thankfully, Br. Bernard avoided getting sick. · Brother Allen and Brother Yohan who were also sick during those times made sure that everyone ate their meals and took their medicines.

In May 2023, Brother Yohan was blessed to finally proceed with his planned Way of Santiago, a month-long Pilgrimage on foot in Spain. He had been planning this since 2019 as part of his Silver Jubilee celebration as a Marist Brother. Due to the pandemic, he had his plan realized only last year. Currently, Brother Yohan is very active in the Laudato Si initiatives and he facilitates a program in the nearby Kitasuma Parish.

Brother Joseph is turning 94 on April 16. He just retired from the translation work he had been doing for the past few decades. As for Brother Bernard, he was bedridden last July, and it took him months to be able to walk properly. He is still recovering from his sickness and is using the aid of a walker, an electric chair, or a walking stick for him to move around, going up and down the stairs to the dining hall. Bro. Bernard and Brother Joseph attend physical therapy sessions for the elderly. The sessions are beneficial for them to stay physically well.

Brother Allen will be a full-time employee of MBIS starting in August 2023. He is now a homeroom adviser of Grade 7, teaching Religion classes from Grades 1 to 10, and a coach of both boys' and girls' middle school basketball teams. On Sundays, he volunteers as a catechist, choir member, and Mass commentator in both Kobe Central Church and Akashi Church.

Last September, Br. Joseph Yoshida celebrated his 60th year as a Marist Brother. The Eucharistic Celebration was presided by Father Thirdie Caballero, a Filipino Vincentian priest currently assigned in Koshien Parish. The Provincial, Br. Allan de Castro and his council were present in the said event.

Back in November, our community went to the Kobe Foreigner's Cemetery in Mt. Futatabi for our annual visit to the grave of the Marist Brothers. Afterward, we had our outing at the nearby Kobe Municipal Arboretum to see the autumn foliage. But on our way home, our car got accidentally bumped from behind by another car! Thankfully, no one got hurt, and both cars only got scratches.

Throughout the year, our community had the privilege of hosting a number of visitors. It is one of our busiest years in terms of the number of guests we received. It was a joy for us to receive Br. Patrick McNamara, former Provincial of USA, in his first-ever visit to the Kobe community last April.

Br. Arnel Alfanta visited the community last June, and we traveled here in Kansai. Br. Jo-An Legaste also visited us here last July. Relatives of Br. Yohan visited us last July to enjoy the summer in Suma Beach. Br. Allan de Castro, Br. Rommel Ocasiones, and Br. Anthony Tan had their Provincial Council meeting here last September. Our Sector Leader, Br. Jacobo Song visited us here during the second week of December. Brother Allen's family visited Kobe at the end of December and spent their New Year here. I hope our visitors enjoyed their stay here in Kobe.

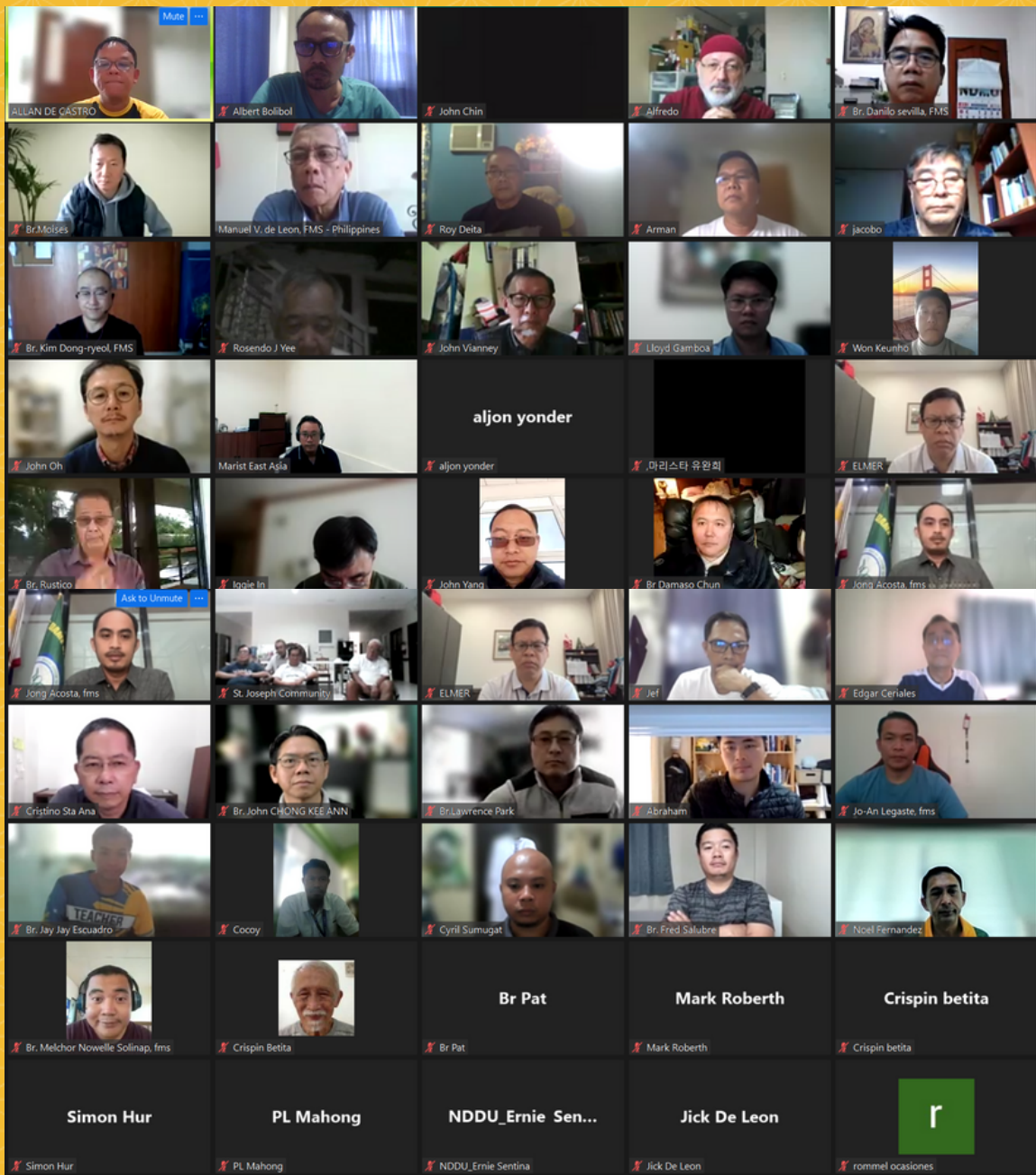


EAST ASIA PROVINCE HOLDS BROTHERS' ASSEMBLY ONLINE

Undaunted, Liz used airport WIFI to call a waiting Brother outside, overcoming language barriers through collaboration. The Brother's negotiation with an intermediary paved the way for her passage.

Approaching the exit, another obstacle arose as airport personnel questioned her origin and Christmas gifts for her Brother. Responding with a mix of disappointment and fatigue, Liz pressed on.

Amidst meeting her community members, Liz steadfastly maintained a warm smile, resolute in embracing the unfolding experience. As they progressed towards the community house, the harsh realities of poverty came into sharp focus, designating it as the most economically challenged place Liz had ever encountered. Upon reaching the house, a modest dinner followed, and Liz seized the moment to rest and engage in thoughtful reflection.

Inclusive and Integral Pedagogy: Skills in Ministering to the Young People

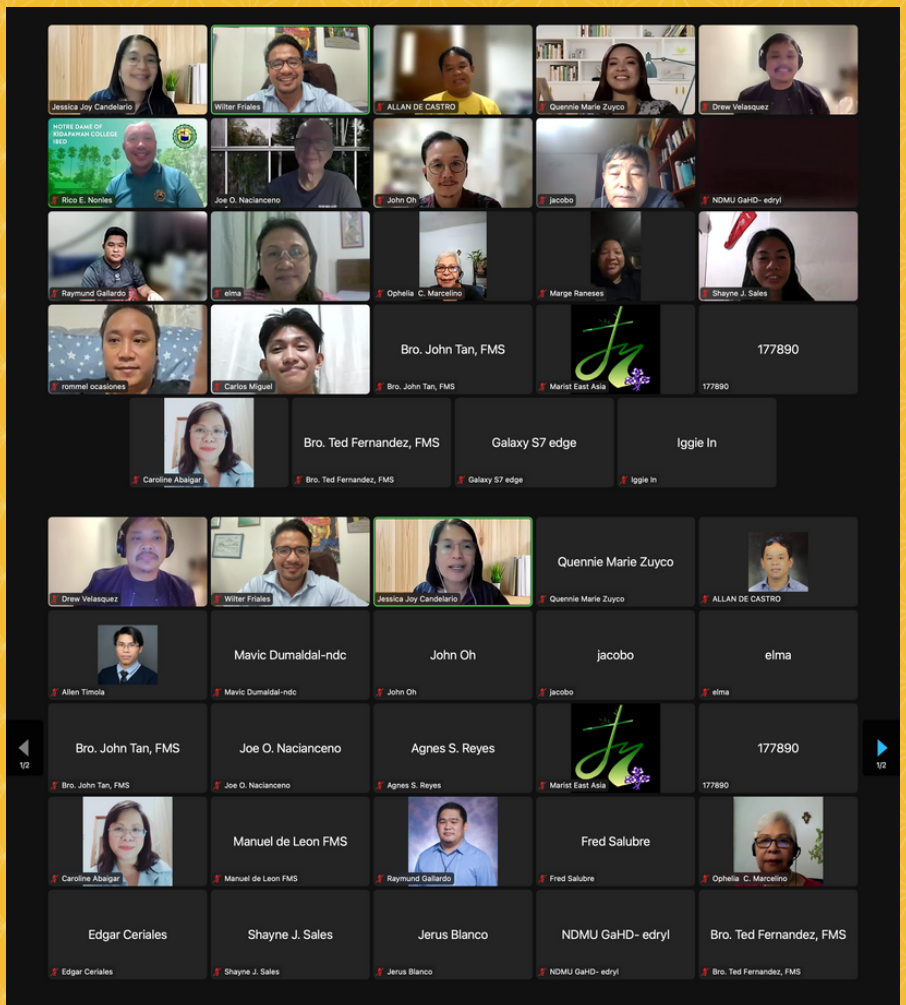
On December 22, 2023, at 7 PM, a session on **Skills in Ministering to the Young People** was conducted. This webinar was attended by around 30 people mostly coming from the Marist community, administrators, teachers, and students alike. The activity initiated by the Province Center, was a concrete response to Pope Francis' call to synodality, that is, to reflect together the essence of being-one-with and the importance of youth participation in our journeying together as the people of God. The said activity is also a part of the continuing reflection on the Statements of the 6th Provincial Chapter of the East Asia Province, particularly on being "bridge builders" on the concerns of the youth.

Ms. Jessica Joy Candelario and Mr. Andrew Napoleon Velasquez, the esteemed resource speakers for the event, are both members of the Bukal ng Tipan Pastoral Center, a center that journeys towards the vision of a synodal and participatory church.

The one-hour interactive webinar revolved around the mission Christians ought to share with one another—that is, journeying with each other, especially Marist educators' journey with their students. Mr. Velasquez, after sharing his own personal journey with the youth, challenged the participants to think of a Marist youth they have been journeying with and to share it with the group; this transcended to a heartfelt discussion of concerns and struggles. Ms. Candelario, on the other hand, placed emphasis on the following goals of Marist Educators' ministering to the young people: (1) The Hard Work of Listening, (2) Wishing for an Authentic Church, (3) A More Relational Church, and (4) A Community Committed to Justice. Moreover, the discussion underscored that the Catholic school education's goal, is "not to proselytize, but to bring young people and children forward in human values in all realities, and one such reality is transcendence." A brief but meaningful feedback portion of the event smoothly concluded the event.

Indeed, inclusive and integral pedagogy—this is what Catholic school education is all about; the Catholic community continues to hope and pray that the Marist schools and institution remain steadfast in realizing such with the grace of God, while embarking on a journey of synodality with the children and the youth.

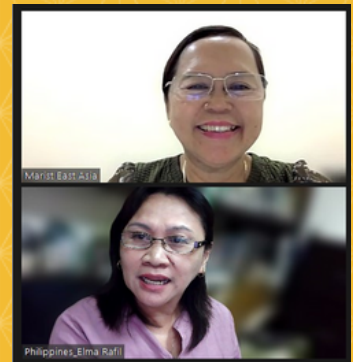


LAITY DESK UPDATE:

Last January 15, Ms. Elma Rafil, Chair of the Laity Commission, and Ms. Agnes Reyes, Laity Desk Coordinator, met to discuss the upcoming initiatives for the Marist Laity. Reviewing the Key Result Area for Lay Partnership, they proposed priorities to address from 2024 onwards. The following were highlighted:

- Marist Lay Vocation Encounter is scheduled for March 23-24, 2024.
- Formulation of the Guidelines for the Renewal of CMMF. Formation of three phases prior to the August 15 renewal of commitment.
- Intensify the formation of the Friends of Marcellin.
- Request for a brother-point person to accompany the growth of Marist Lay life in each community.
- Intensify involvement of MAREX and New Marists in Mission groups.
- Further, animate the laity in other sectors. Plan out regular formation sessions online with the laity from other sectors.

The strengthening of collaborative initiatives between the Laity Desk and the Laity Commission is aimed to further animate the laity, particularly in the conduct of formation that embodies the development of vocational itineraries.



CYPD Coordinates with NDEA for Anti-OSAEC 2nd Year Advocacy



The advocacy against online sexual abuse and exploitation of children (OSAEC) is now in its 2nd year of implementation under the funding grant of Misaan Cara. During its first year of implementation, trainings were conducted to all 63 schools of NDEA. The first program cycle was intended to provide and equip the school administrators with the awareness of the abuse and the mechanisms of combatting the risks through the setting up of protection protocols and guidelines for reporting. The student leaders were also given the opportunity for this training.

Last January 15, Ms. Agnes Reyes coordinated with Dr. Evelyn Dollete, the NDEA Executive Director for the implementation of the 2nd Phase targeting parents and students in the schools of all NDEA member schools. Br. Crispin P. Betita, FMS, the Chair of the Child and Youth Protection Desk hopes that a greater consciousness on the protection of children against all forms of online risks will eventually help and benefit children, a cause so close to the heart of St. Marcellin.

WHAT WE DO?

We are Marist Brothers, missionaries to the Indigenous People (I.P.s) in Palawan particularly in Malutok, Ransang, Rizal.

We aim to share the mission of our Founder, St. Marcellin Champagnat, in the field of education, especially to the peripheries of society - to those who are least favored.

We are focused on education and the promotion of cultural preservation.

OUR WORK

We strongly believe that education is not only for those who can afford it. It is an equally given opportunity to everyone. There are just others who do not have the resources to avail of it. Since we arrived in 2000, we have been able to send I.P. students to primary, secondary, and now tertiary schools in Palawan. We believe that when given positive attention through holistic education, the Palaw'ans can deliver themselves from poverty and eventually contribute to National development.



THE BENEFITS OUTWEIGH THE RISKS

Moving up the next ladder of education is the best feeling ever. It was the best feeling because, despite the challenges, you were able to reach your goal at last. Last June 29, 2023, twenty-one (21) kids had their moving-up ceremony in our level one education system in our Binikyat extension. These kids come from nearby areas in our mission school; some are a 20-minute walk away, and others are two mountains away from our school. And worst, some kids (with their parents) risk their safety by crossing flooded rivers, through a log footbridge, walking under heavy rains, and some wake up at 5:00 in the morning to reach the school to study basic writing, reading, and arithmetic. They risk themselves daily with the aim of learning. I felt that for these kids, it is more than the best feeling ever but more of an achievement because, despite the risks, they made it through.
