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From the Editor's Desk!

Celebrated on May 31, the Feast of the Visitation of the Blessed Virgin Mary honors Mary's visit to her cousin, Elizabeth. The joyful meeting of these two women celebrated two miraculous pregnancies: Elizabeth had conceived in her old age after suffering from infertility, and Mary, as a virgin, conceived by the Holy Spirit. At their reunion, John the Baptist leapt into Elizabeth's womb, and she blessed Mary and the Christ Child. Mary, in turn, responded with the famous Magnificat praising the Lord.

The First Lesson of the Visitation: Mary's Obedience

As Pope Benedict XVI has said, this feast day calls us to recognize Mary's humility and willingness to be used by God, and strive to imitate it in our own lives:

"Going beyond the surface, Mary "sees" the work of God in history with the eyes of faith... Her Magnificat, at the distance of centuries and millennia, remains the truest and most profound interpretation of history, while the interpretations of many of this world's wise have been belied by events in the centuries...

Let us bring the same sentiments of praise and thanksgiving of Mary to the Lord, her faith and her hope, her docile abandonment in the hands of Divine Providence. May we imitate her example of readiness and generosity in the service of our brethren. Indeed, only by accepting God's love and making of our existence a selfless and generous service to our neighbor, can we joyfully lift a song of praise to the Lord."

Ultimately, Mary's ready acceptance of God's will for her life enabled her to practice the true charity of Christ:

"We find reflected in Mary's visitation the hopes and expectations of the humble, God-fearing people who were awaiting the fulfillment of the prophetic promises... By accepting the divine will, Mary offered her active cooperation so that God could become man in her maternal womb. She bore the divine Word within her as she went to visit her elderly cousin who, in turn, was awaiting the Baptist's birth. In this act of human solidarity, Mary demonstrated that authentic charity grows within us when Christ is present." – St. John Paul II

The Visitation is Reminding of Us of Our Joy in Christ. Mary and Elizabeth's joy reminds us of how the Church ought to respond to Christ's incarnation:

"Mary, living Tabernacle of God made flesh, is the Ark of the Covenant in whom the Lord visited and redeemed his people. Jesus' presence filled her with the Holy Spirit. When she entered Elizabeth's house, her greeting was overflowing with grace: John leapt in his mother's womb as if he were aware of the coming of the One whom he would one day proclaim to Israel. The children exulted, the mothers exulted. This meeting imbued with the joy of the Holy Spirit, is expressed in the Canticle of the Magnificat.

Is this not also the joy of the Church, which ceaselessly welcomes Christ in the holy Eucharist and brings him into the world with the testimony of active charity, steeped in faith and hope? Yes, welcoming Jesus and bringing him to others is the true joy of Christians!" – Pope Benedict XVI

Just as Mary went to visit her cousin to share the good news of her pregnancy, so too should we share the joy of Christ with the world:

"We recognize in the Virgin Mary who goes to visit her kinswoman Elizabeth the clearest example and the truest meaning of our journey as believers and of the journey of the Church herself. The Church is missionary by her very nature, she is called to proclaim the Gospel everywhere and always and to pass on the faith to every man and woman, and to every culture." (Pope Benedict XVI)

"Because of her unique role in Christ's life and work, [Mary] has become the exemplar of the Church's life and mission. What Mary has been to Jesus the Church is now called to be in the fulfillment of Christ's saving work to the ends of the earth. Like Mary bringing to Elizabeth the Good News of salvation and the presence of the Savior himself, the Church exists through the centuries to proclaim the Gospel message to all peoples and to offer them the light, life, and love of Christ the Savior." Marist Community of India Celebrated 50 Years of Presence

On 18 May, in Trichy, the Marist Community gathered to celebrate the 50th anniversary of the Marist presence in India. The colored solemn Eucharistic Celebration was broadcasted (https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=Kj2fylY6izc) and counted with the participations of representatives from different parts of the Institute. Brothers Josep Maria Soteras and Sylvain Ramandimbiarisoa represented the General Government of the Institute and Br. Sunanda, Vice-Provincial, the Province of South Asia. There were also Brothers representative from the Province Star of the Sea.

The mass was celebrated by the Archbishop of Madurai, Most Rev. Antony Pappusamy and concelebrated by the bishop of Tiruchirappalli, Most Rev. Arokiaraj, and the bishop of Dindigul, Most Rev. Thomas Paulsamy. The celebration was followed by other priests, consecrated people and many laypeople link with the Marist Mission in India.

The Golden Jubilee celebration of the Marist Brothers' foundation in India (1974-2024) had as theme "Heart of Mary, Hands of Service".



Marist presence in India

The three pioneer Brothers were Sri-Lankan and arrived on 1st May 1974, and they were Brothers Gregory Appuhamy, Sunanda Joseph Perera and Godfrey Edward Perera.

Upon arrival they prepared the first Marist House at Thillainagar, in Trichy. Later, in 1975, was inaugurated a house for the Postulancy at Ramilinga and, in 1977, began the novitiate at Tricky. In 1978 the First Indian Brothers professed in Sri Lanka scholasticate. Since then, the brothers have also developed several schools and projects to help "untouchable" children break the cycle of poverty.

Marist Brothers in India are engaged in both educational and social services. Thousands of students have graduated in the last 20 to 30 years through the Marist schools. Many children and young people have been empowered and supported in terms of education and healthcare. The Marist mission has had a significant impact on the children especially in rural villages.

Currently South Asia Province has four communities in Tamil Nadu, India. And all together there are 17 Brothers from the province in the sector, divided into the following Marist communities:

- Maria Shanthi Illam at Uyyakondan Thirumalai, Trichy. This is also Regional Office and formation house. There are 6 Brothers.
- Marcellin Nivasa Community at P.Udayapatti, Karur district. There are 5 Brothers and all of them are working in the schools there.
- Gregory Illam, Marist Community at Mangamanuthu, Dindigul district. There are 2 Brothers working in the school.
- Marist Brothers House at Viyazhanmedu, Trichy district. There are 2 Brothers.

There are four schools belong to South Asia Province, India Sector: Marist Boys Primary School at P. Udayapatti, Karur; Marist Higher Secondary School at P. Udayapatti, Karur; St. Marcellin Higher Secondary School, Mangamanuthu, Dindigul; Marist Nursery and

Primary School, Viyazhanmedu, Trichy. Those schools are both self-financed and partly supported by the Government except Marist Nursery and Primary School at Viyazhanmedu which is fully self-financed. All the schools are in rural villages and students belong to economically backward class.



Marist District of Asia (MDA) is also present in India and has a community in the village of Talit. Two brothers from South Asia are commissioned here working in MDA. In Talit community there are other 2 Brothers from West Bengal (India) that belong to MDA.

Marcellin Trust

Marcellin Trust is a registered and non-profit organization run by the Marist Brothers. There are different projects under the Trust such as Operation Rainbow which provides care and support to HIV/AIDS affected people, La Valla Evening Study Centre. These two projects Chetana Tribal Boys Hostel and community College come under Marcellin Trust but which belong to MDA.



Support for the Mission in India

Missions in the Indian sector are supported by FMSI, Australian Marist Solidarity, India Village Project (Dundee, Scotland) and Maist colleges in Australia and Scotland. There are others such as Misean Cara and the Italian Bishop's Conference.

The more we are open to the Lord and the more we let Him come into our lives we begin to feel we are no longer lonely. Therefore, let us make our hearts a dwelling place for Jesus to get rid of loneliness and aloneness.

see that he resembles Jesus?" Unlike in his photograph, he had long black hair and black beard when he was young. No student dared to ask Mr. Lalith Obris, to whom we were referring. Not that he was strict but we maintained the distance. The unanswered questions are answered today after 45 years. "No, I didn't."




He is the son of Mr. Leonard Obris, one of the eminent old boys and veteran teachers at Maris Stella College, Negombo. In short, Mr. Leonard Obris was a legend in the annals of the Alma Mater. Mr. Lalith Obris was a student from 1956 to 1966, and during the tenure of Bro. Gregory Aloysius Appuhamy (1977) joined the academic staff and he served his Alma Mater for 31 years.

Most he taught religion in primary grades and some years at the request of the principals he taught religion in upper grades. He was quite supportive of Bro. Joseph Fonseka for cub scouting. He was an

active member of the College 'Daham Committee' and was also the master in charge of the College Book Shop. In addition to his duties at school, he was a lifelong member of the Julian House.

In the latter part of his 31 years of service to his Alma Mater, he attended school without obtaining leave for fifteen years at a stretch. What an outstanding achievement of a teacher! It is a testimony to his dedication and commitment. After saying 'adieu' to his career he enjoys life in tranquility. Let us thank the Lord for all the good He has done through Mr. Obris to the community and implore God's choicest blessings for him to continue to silent mission.

Short reflection from Bro. Alex's diary


Am I an individualist or communitarian as living in my community?

A guru asked his disciples if they could say When the *night ended and the day began*.

One of them said, "When you see an animal from a distance, you can tell if it's a cow or a cow. horse" "No," said the guru. "When you look at a tree from a distance, you can distinguish whether it's a mango or a cashew." - "Neither," said the guru. "Okay," said his disciples, "tell

us when it is." "When you look a man in the face and recognize him, He is your brother, when you look a woman in the face and you recognize in her your sister. If you're not able to This, then, whatever time it is, it's still night." This is one of the familiar stories from the book of "one-minute wisdom" by a famous Indian theologian Fr. Anthony de Mello

Dear Brothers, for the last two weeks I was challenged by many areas of community life, especially our Marist community life. I am happy to share with you a few points what I learned or renewed learning about our Marist community life. Last 27 years as a Marist brother, I met



different types of brothers; there are brothers fully committed to their commitments, community life, mission, and collaboration with the local parish, diocese, particularly with the young people and children as their Apostolic life. But there are brothers who live alone in the community, for some reasons... maybe neglected by the other members, by color, caste, language, dignity, power and authorities; which is a curse for the brother. Some brothers are choosing their companions, favourite ones, to relate with selfish in the community, whom they like. Some may love them, and do anything for them while rejecting the other brothers for nothing. By language, country, power and authorities, groupism... all kinds of division... but we professed to live with the three vows and call ourselves brothers and talk more about 'Brotherhood' or 'brotherly love'. Is there any meaning? Are some of us also doing the same, living a partial brotherly love, choosing to whom we want to love, even supporting the brother if he committed a big mistake, hiding it because I love him? Other hand, if I don't like a brother, even if he commits a small mistake, make it a big issue and wait for the chance to pull down the brother? Pope Francis often speaks of one thing for some years wherever he meets the Religious people...the big issue very active among the Religious is "gossiping" it becomes very common among the men religious... isn't it true among us? How long we spend time talking about other brothers, especially when the particular brother is not present there... Even small things but we make a big story and spread it quickly with less truth and try to spoil the name of the brother or give him more difficulties in his life. I heard this from some brothers, "living in the community... alone..." How good it is to hear as the members of the community by our profession?

These years (2021-2024) Pope Francis started the Synod of the Bishops... but it's not only the bishops and Cardinals with the Pope, religious priests, Brothers, sisters and some lay people also working together. One among them is our Superior General, Br. Ernesto also an active member in this Synod. The last circular brings this article, "The family is the pillar of every Christian community. Parents and grandparents and all those who live and share their faith in the family are the first missionaries. The family, as a community of life and love, is a privileged place of education in faith and Christian practice, one that needs special accompaniment within communities. Support is especially needed for parents who must reconcile work, including within the Church community and in service to its mission, with the demands of family life." If we don't learn this community living in our own family, it's hard to live it here in our communities. Let us think about what I was re-challenged about community life though you know better than me about it. Community is not only an institution; it is also a process.

- Community is not constituted once and for all, but is built day by day. It is an action verb and not just a noun.
- Community is not a conquest of ours achieved by our own efforts. We are not capable of achieving the ideal of the Acts of the Apostles: to be "of one heart", "of one soul" and to have everything in common.
- Community is grace when: we recognize God as our Father and Mary as our Mother and you feel as children and brothers and sisters; you welcome the presence and the word of the Risen Lord and recognize each other as disciples of the one Master; you feel stimulated by the love of the Spirit that is poured into your hearts.
- Community is "When you look a man in the face and recognize him, He is your brother, when you look a woman in the face and you recognize in her your sister.

This type of community makes your mission credible to society.

Our *goal* to grow as a community in mission can be expressed in three words: joy, home & school, witness and proclamation:

- Joy: Rediscovering the joy of living in Communities that are home and school of communion, that witness to the primacy of God and are themselves the proclamation of the Gospel. "To live in Community is Joy, individualism is not a source of Joy; disconnection from others leads to depression and self-destruction. Only relationships make us living being.
- Communities home and school of communion": to make grace and dialogue flow among all the brothers, so that joy may be contagious and mutual forgiveness and reconciliation may restore us.
- **Community shaped by mission:** it is itself a witness to the primacy of God against any kind of idolatry and is the proclamation of the Gospel of the New Covenant.

Our goal with regard to economy: The word economy means "the rule of the house". This objective as growth can be expressed in three words: communion, solidarity, expression-style: Our objective with regard to the leadership of the house can be expressed infive words: discernment, accompaniment, missionary synergies, creativity and innovation. (thanks for Fr. Cristo Jose, cmf, for his sharing)

Brothers, thank you for reading and listening to it... if it challenges us personally, we can change our attitudes and work together for the Kingdom of God as one brother. Share our brotherly love not with our beloved one, but the brothers who are needed, rejected ones, unnoticed ones and try to live first Christians with the guidance of the Apostles. "love your enemies" (Mt 5:44) here the enemies are the brothers whom we don't love in the community.

Marist Brothers' Journey into the Wilderness: A Spiritual Retreat in Nature

With the conclusion of the Marist Asia Committee meeting held at Bolawalana's serene pastures, the committee members were invited to visit the flora and fauna of Sri Lanka's best game reserve, Wilpattu National Park, also known as the "Land of Lakes." This adventure, organized and facilitated by Brother Chinthana, Mr. Jude, and several other lay members, began with a journey from Negombo at around 6:00 AM. The destination, 166 km away, was reached at 11:30 AM.



Upon arrival at Sri Lanka's largest national park, spanning 1,085 square kilometers, the brothers ventured 12 km into the forest to reach the 'Marandamaduwa' circuit bungalow. This bungalow, located next to a crocodile-inhabited lake, is surrounded by tall trees

providing sanctuary to various bird species, creating an eye-catching and serene environment.

Following a delicious lunch prepared by Nayana, Ayesha, and Thushari, the brothers embarked on a game safari in safari jeeps at 2:00 PM. They witnessed an array of wildlife, including the majestic Asian elephant, vibrant migrant birds, and local bird species such as the Sri Lankan junglefowl, blue-tailed bee-eater, Indian peafowl, painted stork, and Malabar pied hornbill. Reptiles like the mugger crocodile and Bengal monitor, along with mammals like the Sri Lankan axis deer, tufted gray langur, and Sri



Lankan sambar deer, were also spotted. The highlight of the safari was the sighting of the elusive leopard (Panthera pardus kotiya) in its best postures, a rare and thrilling experience for all.



As the sun set, a barbecue was arranged by the lay team. Though music was prohibited in the sanctuary, the brothers shared their day's experiences amidst the natural sounds of the forest. Using torches, they glimpsed the gleaming eyes of a herd of deer and resting crocodiles by the lakeside, a fascinating sight under the night sky. The forest, alive with nocturnal activity, offered surprises such as the roaring of a leopard and the alarmed cries of deer during the night.

The next morning began early with breakfast at the park's entrance. On their return journey, the brothers visited the Kalpitiya mission managed by Brother Lal Fonseka and enjoyed lunch organized by Brother Sujith. They departed for Negombo at around 2:30 PM, concluding their enriching journey.



The Counseling Programme

Clinical mental health counseling provides a safe space for teens to explore distressing thoughts and emotions, work through childhood trauma, and build stronger connections with family members. Having realized the benefits of Counseling Rev. Fr. Anton Dinesh, the parish priest of Godalla invited Br. Chamara and a few other sisters listened to the students of grades 9 and 10, who were getting ready to receive the sacrament of confirmation.

During the programme we helped children to know why we need counseling. It gives you a safe time and place to talk to someone who won't judge you. It helps you make sense of things and understand yourself better. help you resolve complicated feelings, or find ways to live with them. help you recognize unhelpful patterns in the way you think or act, and find ways to change them (if you want to).

It was new for them the concept of counseling. We taught that Counseling provided by trained professionals can make a profound impact on the lives of individuals, families, and communities. This service helps people navigate difficult life situations, such as the death of a loved one, divorce, natural disasters, school stress, and the loss of a job.

We invite all the principals, in charge of catechism schools to develop Counseling and it can help our young people better understand their emotions, they can learn healthy ways to cope with stress, they can improve their self-esteem and build strong relationships, they can











pursue their future goals. The programme was successful and found many students for further sessions.
